



A Rocky Road to Easter

When they had sung the hymn, they went out to the Mount of Olives. And Jesus said to them, 'You will all become deserters; for it is written, "I will strike the shepherd, and the sheep will be scattered." But after I am raised up, I will go before you to Galilee.' Mark 14:26-28

How difficult must it have been for Jesus to face his final hours not knowing whether his followers could carry on the mission that he launched? It is beyond the imagination of most of us to conceive all that Jesus was feeling and facing during this time that we have come to call "Holy Week." Ushered into Jerusalem with the shouts of "Hosanna," and received as a fulfillment to prophecy one day, confronting and challenging political, military, and religious leadership in days following, saying goodbye and being arrested, tried, beaten, and crucified. Few of us can fathom the stress and emotion of this time. And Jesus questioned whether his closest friends and followers ever fully grasped what was to come. Peter's denial. Judas' betrayal. The abandonment of the remaining disciples. The rejection of the crowds. The mockery. The agony. Feeling forsaken.

Only Easter allows this to make any sense. Only the resurrection and all it symbolizes and means provides any redemption to this level of sacrifice and suffering. No wonder we often race to Easter, to celebrate new life in Jesus, to escape the darkness and despair of Good Friday and Black Saturday. Who wants to dwell in uncertainty, doubt, guilt, remorse and shame?

Yet, there is much value and benefit to thinking through our own discipleship and commitment as we prepare to meet the risen Lord. It is easy to judge Peter, to condemn Judas, to shake our heads at James and John and Thomas and the others. But staying together and staying committed is always easier from a distance. There is a good chance that we would not have fared any better than the disciples were we to find ourselves in their places.

Deserting in both big and small ways is a natural and normal defense mechanism. We seek safety and survival. We seek comfort and protection. When the storms are raging all around us, we look for cover and sanctuary. Who intentionally heads into danger and threat?

But we sometimes forget that there is NO Easter without Good Friday and all the events leading up to it. The road to Easter is rocky and rough, but that makes it all the more amazing, all the more miraculous. God prepares the road for us. God walks the road with us. God waits for us at the other end. But only if we stay on the road from start to finish.

Our United Methodist Church is going through some rough times. We are on a rocky road. People are failing. People are betraying. People are being hurt. People are feeling abandoned. People are giving into weakness. People are lashing out – with words if not with swords. People are running away. People are hiding.

Should we condemn them? Should we judge? Are we not among them? Perhaps the best course of action is one of grace and humility and gentleness and kindness. Perhaps we need to understand that we need each other to make it up the road, to get through the darkness, and to emerge – together – into the light of resurrection and new life. In the pain and suffering of loss, betrayal, loneliness, darkness, and despair, we can get distracted. We can begin to feel that what we are experiencing in the moment is the ultimate reality. But we are Easter people. Darkness never defeats the light. Despair never has the last word over hope. And death is an illusion, intended to confuse us and make us forget who we really are. Easter people. Now and forevermore. Thanks be to God.

GIVING

Who Should Know What I Give?

May 2019

^{1b} I exhort the elders among you ²to tend the flock of God that is in your charge, exercising the oversight ... as God would have you do it ... ⁴And when the chief shepherd appears, you will win the crown of glory that never fades away. (1 Peter 5:1b-4)

The answer to the question, “Who should know what I give?” is simple and straightforward: **100% of the people who need to know and 0% of the people who do not need to know.**

I have donated to a number of nonprofit organizations and have never wondered who sees my donation. Nevertheless, I would certainly expect that the number who do see it includes those needed to process the gift, and those who would solicit the gift and thank me, including the CEO who is also gift solicitor-in-chief. In addition, there would be auditors who would need to have access to all financial records.

In our churches, it is the same. The financial secretary and counters process gifts. During the week, office staff may process checks that come in and produce reports on giving from the church database. The Stewardship team needs to see giving records in order to make plans for stewardship campaigns, say thanks, and to guide asking for future gifts. Finally, the Pastor needs to know in order to participate in financial Stewardship of the church as well as congregational care.

The 2016 General Conference confirmed what the pastor’s role was already by amending the Book of Discipline to read, “*To ensure membership care including compliance with charitable giving documentation requirements and to provide appropriate pastoral care, the pastor ... **shall** have access to and responsibility for professional stewardship of congregational giving records.*” [Emphasis added.]

During the annual church audit, the church may share giving data with the auditors, as well.

UNITED METHODIST WOMEN

Next Meeting June 12th at 1pm at Central UMC

Seven women attended the April 10th meeting. We enjoyed listening to Pastor Ran tell us about Butterfly House. If you missed the meeting or just want to learn more about Butterfly House, a place for people recovering from addiction, visit <https://butterflyhousescf.org/>.

In keeping with our study "Living Simply" I asked members to write down and then share some of the things they do to go along with this topic. Below is a summary of the responses:

- Recycle, Recycle, Recycle cans/plastic/paper/etc.
- We all agreed that it is important to check with your trash handler or local recycle center to be sure you know how and what to recycle.
- There are many uses for peroxide, an inexpensive agent that is less toxic than bleach, for disinfecting around the house. You can use peroxide for household cleansers and personal care products that you make at home.
- There are tons of recipes on the Web for inexpensive earth friendly and people/animal friendly products that you can make.
- Shop at thrift stores, second hand stores, rummage sales and craft sales to reduce the waste of earth's resources.
- Whatever time of year you do your "spring" cleaning (I do mine in winter) enjoy less clutter. Donate clothes and items no longer needed to thrift stores and rummage sales. Also, some housing complexes have "free" tables. Be sure not to bring stained or heavily soiled clothed or non repairable items to these places as you will be hampering intended mission or service agendas.
- To avoid food waste try some simple meals, use leftovers and food already on hand before going grocery shopping. Can or freeze excess perishable food. Try a weekly menu.
- Try to lower temperatures a couple of degrees in winter and raise them a couple of degrees in summer to use less utilities. It is often possible to find new "comfort" temperatures.
- Combine trips from home to conserve gas.


We hope that "Living Simply" will ultimately give us more time for devotions, prayer, relaxation with our loved ones and the ability to give more away.
