For June I am continuing the series of articles trying to explain Methodism in an easily understandable way, through my ministerial experiences. I hope these articles will help you better understand Methodism and confirm and develop your faithful identification as a Methodist.

Q) What Is Our Understanding (as Methodists) of Evil as It Exists in the World?

We believe God is perfectly good and all-powerful. God created the best of all possible universes (Genesis 1:31). However, humans fell down to sin and evil because they used their free will, given by God. Human disobedience to God leads to evil. The immoral human nature brings evil.

First, systematic evil causes social problems like unemployment, homelessness, crime, and the gap between the rich and poor. It is not only a personal problem, but also a national and global problem. When I was a missionary, I witnessed this systematic evil in the Chechen Republic in the south of Russia. The nation of Chechen had some wars with Russia. Even though the war was finished, many people still lived in poverty and suffering. Yet there were many millionaires who were oil tycoons and had political power in Russia. Their houses looked like palaces. They had security through terrorism. Many Chechen people called them the Modern Tsars. Due to this broken system, the majority of the Chechen people live in poverty. Also, many children, youth and young adults follow and fall down to extremist Islam ideas. One of the main reasons for this is the economic hardship and injustice experienced by so many in the Chechen republic. Clearly, systematic evil causes human suffering and misery in the Chechen republic and all over the world.

Second, evil is both an individual and collective action. According to Genesis, humans were created in the image of God. However, the image of God in humans was broken because of the disobedience of humankind. This means individual evil is rooted in human disobedience towards God. Human corruption causes selfishness, greed and maliciousness. Violence, murder, racism, and discrimination came from human corruption. Beyond human evil, there is collective evil like Islamic State (ISIS), the extremist Islamic terrorist group in the Middle East. This is news to us. Several years ago, they captured some American and Western European journalists and cut off their heads. They even uploaded a video of it on to YouTube. Many people could not repress their astonishment. Of course, the Islamic State is only a small minority of Islam, so we should never make the mistake of hasty generalizations about the religion of Islam, but it shows how extreme theology and groups can be evil in the world.

Even though we have some problems in the world, I believe we will overcome our problems with God's grace. One of the most important things in the good news of Jesus Christ is that God gives us the power to overcome evil through God's grace (Romans 8). Also, we need to be self-controlled and alert to the evil power that is around us. Jesus taught us to pray "lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil." We should seek holiness and try to achieve Christian perfection as United Methodists and as Christians.

Central's 2017 Finances in Review

We finished 2017 in good financial condition. Central's financial support and expenses were nearly equal and we paid 100% of our Apportionments.

At the Charge Conference Oct. 23, 2016 we approved a total budget of \$101,627, of that \$68459 was Shared Expenses and \$33,187 was Central's operations and maintenance. The total of \$101,627 was further reduced by St. Croix Falls support of the Parish in the amount of \$6,720, and an Apportionment reduction on \$5,743. Leaving an amount of \$89,164 that was needed to meet our projected budget.

Our actual expenditures were <u>\$84,957</u>. Our income was <u>\$85,413</u> which included General Giving (\$74,158), Fund Raising (\$1,498), Rental Income (\$6,000), Equitable Compensation (\$3,520), and Misc. \$237.

2017 was a good year for Central. In addition to meeting our financial obligation, we were able to save money for future expenses. We have established designated funds for an emergency Equipment Replacement Fund, a Capital Fund, and a Rental Reserve Fund. These should ensure that we are capable of meeting any unanticipated expenses.

2018 Looks to be a promising year with some notable changes coming. Given the strong support the congregation has shown over the past 28 years by completing Phase I, II, and III of the Building project without debit and joining the Upper St. Croix Parish.

With Faith and a positive attitude, we are in a good position to grow and prosper in our Church Family, Parish, and community outreach.

Sisters, We Still Have a Long Way to Go

Being a United Methodist bishop brings me many joys and great satisfaction. I am constantly engaged in conversations about vision for the future, unlimited possibilities, and discernment in God's will for our Church. I serve with so many gifted men and women, in so many levels and capacities of the Church. Most days, I am proud, humbled and honored to be an Episcopal leader.

Then there are days when I feel burdened and sad. When we received the news that the two constitutional amendments concerning gender equality were defeated, I was deeply troubled. What did this mean? Were we saying women are not equal to men? Were we saying there should not be equal treatment and inclusion? Come on! This is not true of the Church I serve! We are rich in our diversity, beginning with gender diversity. Women are created in God's image. Women are led by God's Holy Spirit. Women are gifted to lead. I am proud that The United Methodist Church has long championed the rightness of women in ordained ministry, and in every leadership function at every level of the Church. And I feel very confident that the failure of these constitutional amendments to pass has more to do with other factors than respect and acceptance of women as equal in every way to men.

But, my sisters, we still have a long way to go. There is still sexism in our Church; as there is racism, and other forms of division and exclusion. We have come far – and need to celebrate that – but we still must do better. My heart goes out to every female colleague – and indeed to all our women in The United Methodist Church – for ways they feel dishonored, disrespected, and dismissed. The hurt this has caused is tragic.

My commitment is to lead a Church for all God's people. I am not a bishop who takes sides; I am a bishop who makes space for as many as possible. I am a better pastor, bishop, and man because of the wonderful, gifted women who have nurtured and mentored me along the way. I will continue to do everything in my power to challenge sexism in all its forms, and to bring healing and wholeness to our body of Christ. There can be no unity when one part of the body denies the worth and value of any other part of the body (I Corinthians 12:12-26) and I believe in a body of all, for all. I invite you to be in prayer with me that we may one day become the Church that honors and celebrates every child of God equally and equitably. Thanks be to God!



Questions for a Money Autobiography, Pt 3

His master said to him, 'Well done, good and faithful servant. You have been faithful over a little; I will set you over much. Enter into the joy of your master.' (Matthew 25:23)

From Writing a Money Autobiography by Dan Dick

A money autobiography is a reflection process on the role and influence of money and material possessions in our life. It challenges us to explore the past to see how our attitudes, assumptions, and values concerning money and wealth were formed.

Management Questions concerning money and wealth

- In what ways are you a good manager of money? In what ways are you a poor manager of money?
- How do you feel about talking about your finances with other people? Why do you feel this way?
- Do you use credit cards? Do you pay the monthly balances in full?
 How does buying on credit make you feel? Why?
- How much money do you wish you had in the bank/invested? How did you arrive at this figure? How close is this to what you have?
- How much money do you give to church and charity? Do you tithe?
 How do you decide how much to give? Where to give?
- Do you have a personal budget? Why? How do you make decisions about what to spend, what to save, and what to give?
- What are your greatest financial concerns? How have you made decisions concerning retirement, insurance, drafting a will, etc? If you have not done so, why not?

It is useful to create a **money autobiography journal** to record your thoughts, reflections, and feelings. Then, you can return to the money autobiography journal months and years afterward.
