

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

As many of you know the 2019 Special Session of General Conference has completed its work. Eight hundred and sixty-four United Methodist delegates from across the United States, Africa, Europe and Philippines met in St. Louis from Feb. 24-26 to consider paragraphs of The Book of Discipline concerning human sexuality and ministry to LGBTQIA+ persons.

The General Conference voted against the One Church Plan recommended by the majority of our church's bishops. The General Conference instead passed the Traditional Plan, which maintains the denomination's ban on same-sex marriage and prohibition on the ordination of self-avowed practicing homosexuals with additional accountability for enforcing those policies. The constitutionality of key points within the Traditional Plan has been called into question and will be reviewed by the Judicial Council in April.

Pastor Ran and I are grateful for the prayers of all of you for our churches and our delegates. Some of you may be pleased or relieved by the decisions made by the conference while others are in deep pain and anguish. Pastor Ran and I particularly want to acknowledge the pain this has caused our LGBTQIA+ communities along with their families and loved ones. Please know that all of us including LGBTQIA+ communities are beloved children of God and members of our church community. You are both invited and welcomed to participate in our ministries.

United Methodists are members of a global and diverse denomination and are clearly not of one mind on questions around human sexuality. In spite of our differences, we are all children of God. At a time in which our society is becoming increasing polarized, my hope is still that the church can be a place where people of different backgrounds, cultures and opinions will come together.

The effects of the General Conference's decisions on the denomination are still being determined. None of the legislation will become church law until Jan. 1, 2020. I encourage each of you to give yourselves time to process and heal and continue to offer love to each other. We will continue our vital ministry and seek to be a community that welcomes and loves all people. As we learn more, we will discuss next steps together.

Pastor Ran and I encourage everyone to be in prayer over the next few months for our church, our denomination and for all those who are scared or hurting. Our doors are always open if you need to talk or pray with someone. May we all continue to love one another as Christ loves us.

EASTER FUN FACTS...

Today, Easter is all about egg hunts and chocolate bunnies. But as you stock up on candy and plastic eggs, you might wonder where these traditions originated. Here are just a few interesting facts behind Easter's most common symbols and customs.

1. Eggs are dyed to represent the blood of Jesus Christ. In Orthodox and Eastern Catholic Churches, eggs are dyed red to represent the blood of Jesus, before being blessed and distributed to congregants. Now they're mostly just a fun way to celebrate the springtime season, especially with creative decorating ideas.



- 2. Most adults prefer milk chocolate to dark. Adults are actually twice as likely to prefer the milky stuff.
- 3. Giving eggs is a symbol of "rebirth" in many cultures. The egg symbolizes new life, fertility, and rebirth in many places around the world. Thanks to the rounded shape, it's also been used as a symbol of the earth and our connection with nature.
- 4. Americans will consume more than 16 million jelly beans . That's enough jelly beans to circle the globe not once, not twice, but *three times* or to fill a plastic egg the size of a nine-story building.
- 5. Pretzels are linked to Easter too. Supposedly, it's because the twists of the pretzel look like arms crossed in prayer. You can pay homage to the sweet treat and all it stands for by making these chocolate pretzel treats at home.
- 6. The Easter Bunny didn't always lay eggs. The fluffy bunny stems from the Anglo-Saxon festival of Eastre which featured a spring goddess who used the rabbit to represent fertility. It wasn't until Germans settled in Pennsylvania in the 1700s that the tradition of the bunny that lays eggs came to the states.
- 7. Buying a new outfit for Easter stems from a superstition. Back in the mid-1800s in New York, people believed that buying new clothes to wear on Easter would bring them good luck for the rest of the year.
- 8. Meanwhile Easter bonnets are a relatively new concept in the U.S. Back in 1933, composer Irving Berlin introduced the Easter Bonnet into American pop culture with his ballad "Easter Parade." Today, it's still one of the most popular songs for the holiday.
- 9. Decorating eggs comes from a Ukrainian tradition. The ornate eggs were called pysankas, which were made by using wax and dyes. It wasn't until Ukrainian immigrants came to the U.S. that the colorful custom caught on.
- 10. During medieval times, a very different game was played with eggs. The priest would throw a hard-boiled egg to one of the choir boys, he would continue to toss it to his peers, and whoever was holding the egg when the clock struck 12 was the winner and got to keep it.
- 11. Easter is the second biggest candy-consuming holiday. It comes in second only to Halloween, respectively.
- 12. Americans eat more than 600 million Peeps during Easter. This makes Peeps the most popular non-chocolate Easter candy.
- 13. Most Americans bite off the ears of a chocolate bunny first. 76% eat ears first, 5% eat the feet first, 4% the tail.
- 14. The first White House Easter Egg Roll was in 1878. Rutherford B. Hayes was the president at the time. But it was President Nixon who first included a bunny in the festivities with a member of his wife's staff as the lucky person who got to wear the costume.

Not By Bread Alone

Jesus, full of the Holy Spirit, returned from the Jordan and was led by the Spirit in the wilderness, ²where for forty days he was tempted by the devil. He ate nothing at all during those days, and when they were over, he was famished. ³The devil said to him, 'If you are the Son of God, command this stone to become a loaf of bread.'⁴Jesus answered him, 'It is written, "One does not live by bread alone."

Luke 4:1-4

What do you think of our wilderness time? The Lenten season is a time of reflection and wandering in commemoration of Jesus' wilderness time. Wilderness time is difficult time, it is a trying time, and it is a challenging time. Wilderness time is a test of faith and endurance and perseverance. Wilderness time can be frightening, exhausting, dispiriting time. But wilderness time is rich, fertile, creative time as well. In the wilderness we see what we are really made of. Our depth and breadth are tested. Our coping skills are challenged. And by the grace of God, we rise above our weaknesses and temptations to emerge stronger and better.

The forty days that Jesus journeyed in the wilderness were a time of preparation, training, and grounding. They were a proof of who Jesus was and what Jesus could do through the power of God's guidance and spirit. Through this time and experience, Jesus was affirmed that his faith was greater than a desire for power, for control, for creature comforts, or for basic needs. God provides, and when God gives, we lack for nothing of value.

Do we believe this? Do we truly trust that God will provide all that we could need or hope for? Is our faith greater than our fear? Is our trust more solid than our doubts? Do we ever worry that the devil might be powerful enough to lessen our faith or weaken our resolve? Let us be honest, because we are human.

Our United Methodist Church is currently in a wilderness time, a Lenten season. We do not see a clear way forward. There is anxiety. There is animosity. There is frustration and confusion and exhaustion. It would be so easy to just give up – to sit down on a rock in the desert and quit. We are tired and hungry and cranky and unhappy. At such times it may be almost impossible to say, "thank you, Lord!" It may be hard to stand firm in our faith and say to God "I am ready for whatever may come next!" It may stick in our throat to proclaim, "no I am fine, I have all I need." It is much easier to focus on what we don't have, what we can't do, and how we are not content, than it is to humbly say, "not my will be done, but yours, O Lord."

I do not believe we can fully appreciate what Jesus did in his forty days when we stay comfortable and content in our daily routine. I believe that Lent is a time for some discomfort, for some sacrifice, and for some deep and honest reflection. I encourage us all to pray as often and as hard as we can "thy will be done, O Lord." I encourage us all to fast – if not from food, then from noise or screens or entertainment or snacks or phones or email or any of a thousand things that distract us and encourage a chattering "monkey-mind" to keep us agitated and unfocused. Give more time to God this Lenten season. When you feel angry, turn to God. When you feel empty, turn to God. When you feel anxious, turn to God. When frightened or discouraged or exhausted, turn to God. Don't give in; don't give up. Life can be hard and challenging and even tempting, but God is with you every step of the way.

Most of us cannot even conceive of living "by bread alone." We mostly enjoy good food, warm clothes, adequate shelter. Our lives are so filled with stuff. Our days are packed with activity. Our inboxes are overflowing with messages and requests and demands and offers. We are connected to devices from sun-up to sundown. We exist in a wilderness of sorts each day, every day, wandering without time or space to rest, to reflect, to empty out, and to prepare. When God offers to fill us, we are not ready – like Martha, we are distracted by many things.

During our Lenten journey, I encourage us all to take seriously God's gift of Sabbath – time away from everything. Make space – true wilderness space – to let go. Let go of hurt. Let go of control. Let go of fear. Let go of distrust. Let go of anger. Let go of desire. Let go. Empty yourself. Fast. Prepare. Pray. Breathe. And know that the very Spirit of the living God will provide everything you need and will strengthen you for all that is to come. Thanks be to God.

- •Want to leave a legacy that perpetuates my support for the church
- •Feel fortunate and want to give something back to others
- •My faith teaches me to support the church
- •Want to be seen as a leader/role model

Why do you give? The stewardship leaders of your church should be asking this question of you on a regular basis. If they don't, ask them why not?


Thank you to all who supported the Blood Drive in March. It was a great success thanks to all your efforts and support.




