"The People Who the Lord Needs"

"When they were approaching Jerusalem, at Bethphage and Bethany, near the Mount of Olives, he sent two of his disciples and said to them, 'Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately as you enter it, you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden; untie it and bring it. If anyone says to you, 'Why are you doing this?' just say this, 'The Lord needs it and will send it back here immediately.'" (Mark 11:1-3)

We have a new beginning in a new year, 2020. We nominated or elected the new leadership teams in each church. Some of them have already served the roles for several years, and they are willing to serve them continually. Some of them are newly nominated or elected for the positions. I appreciate them for their services and contributions. Praise to the Lord!

At Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem, we see that Jesus chose what he needs. When they were approaching Jerusalem, Jesus sent two of his disciples and said to them, "Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately as you enter it, you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden; untie it and bring it." And then Jesus gives them additions, "If anyone says to you, 'why are you doing this?' just say this, 'Lord needs it.'" I wonder if the owner of the colt might know who Jesus is. How could he give his colt with just hearing, 'Lord needs it'?

We may guess there are implications. At first, "Lord needs it" implies authority, which one could not resist. The owner of the colt must be a humble and obedient person to the Lord. The other implication we may guess is whatever the Lord needs our Lord Jesus may take for his ministry. Like this, today, the Lord seeks the people who he needs for his ministry. They might be our leaders in the church, and also they might be those who serve humbly without being named.

With gratitude for them, I think what do people pursue in their lives? Some people say they seek the glory and wealth of the world with power and authority. Many people might agree that they want to have the authority and the power of the world. In other words, most would be the master rather than being the servants. We find that even the disciples of Jesus also pursued the authority and the power of the world. They might assume that Jesus would be the king in the world, especially in Rome at that time. The Jewish suffered under the colony of Rome at that period, and they might wait for the Messiah to liberate them from oppression, exploitation and poverty. Finally, when they saw Jesus' authority over the Jewish leaders, and his feeding people, they might expect that Jesus would be the mundane king who emancipates them from all their oppression, exploitation, and poverty. It seems that some of Jesus' disciples used to have these ideas.

One day, the sons of Zebedee, came forward to Jesus and said to him, "Teacher, we want you to do for us whatever we ask of you." The sons of Zebedee are John and James, who were much-closed disciples to Jesus. Jesus used to bring them closer to his ministry than others. They who knew Jesus' special care toward them, requested Jesus. So, Jesus asked them, "What is it you want me to do for you?" and they said, "Grant us to sit, one at your right hand and one at your left in your glory"(Mark10:35-37). What did they expect of Jesus? What does "In your glory," mean? They perhaps thought that they would have the positions which rule the authority and the power over the people when Jesus becomes the king of the world. However, they did not know what the "in your glory" really means. Jesus said to them, "You do not know what you are asking." The other disciples heard that they requested Jesus to reserve their positions, and got angry with John and James. And then, Jesus said to them that Gentile would be the rulers it over people, but it is not so among you. Jesus added that "whoever wishes to become great among you must be your servant, and whoever wishes to be first among you must be the slave of all. For the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life a ransom for many" (Mark 10:43-45).

We are following Jesus as his disciples today. If among us whoever pursues to become great in the world, Jesus might say to us, "whoever wishes to be first among you must be slave of all." Please remember, if our Lord needs it for his ministry, he uses even a colt. I wish we would be the people who our Lord seeks, and who our Lord needs. I hope that we all would be humbly walking with God like the colt and like the owner of the colt.

Concentrating on Our Need for God

3...they voluntarily gave according to their means, and even beyond their means, 4begging us earnestly for the privilege of sharing in this ministry to the saints. (2 Corinthians 8:3b-4)

Self-denial helps us to concentrate on our need for God. It is one thing to say that God provides all the food we need, but is quite another to go without food. It is one thing to say that God provides us with income to provide for our needs, but it is quite another to give 10% of that income back to God to provide for the needs of others.

Fasting and tithing are forms of sacrifice, a Latin word that comes from combining “to make” and “holy or sacred”. Over time, sacrifice has become synonymous with giving something up that is dear to us (self-denial) in order to serve a greater good, like the Kingdom of God.

Lent is a good time to remember that self-denial draws us closer to God. Lenten fasting should not be pro forma as in giving up chocolate, for example. It should be real self-denial accompanied by prayer, repentance and soul-searching.

Sacrificial giving is a fast from spending on yourself and is equally appropriate for Lent, especially if accompanied by prayer, repentance and soul-searching. We are called to sacrificial giving year-round, but at Lent we can especially remember Who and what our sacrifice is for.

A sacrifice to be real must cost, must hurt, and must empty ourselves. Give yourself fully to God. He will use you to accomplish great things on the condition that you believe much more in his love than in your weakness.

Reflection from Bishop Jung on the Protocol of Reconciliation & Grace Through Separation

My sacred and beloved siblings in Christ, our Council of Bishops endorsed the Protocol of Reconciliation and Grace Through Separation proposal that offers an end to the current deep division in our United Methodist Church. I have mixed feelings about the proposal and what it means.

On the one hand, it not only recognizes our differences, but honors a very broad spectrum of beliefs, interpretations, visions, and desires for the church. Not everyone will be happy, but that has been part of our dilemma – there is no way forward that everyone will agree with or support. Our guidance to “Do No Harm,” comes to a place of doing the least harm possible in the short term, that we might do more good in the long term. The Protocol offers a way for moderate and progressive United Methodists to be in ministry in a fully inclusive church and for traditionalists to continue in a ministry that honors certain restrictions. This also recognizes that there is no healthy, adequate “one-size-fits-all” polity and doctrine for a wondrously diverse global church. We have arrived at a place where graceful autonomy is required for different regions of our planet to make decisions that allow for effective ministry and witness. The decisions most appropriate for The United Methodist Church in the United States are not appropriate for Africa, Russia, the Philippines, or other regions of our church. We progress, we evolve, we adapt at different levels, in different ways, at different times. In this case, unity has not been a strength.

We are in a liminal space, preparing to cross a threshold that marks a distinctive and drastic new chapter in the story of Methodism. The proposed Protocol invites us to shift our energies in significant ways. First, we cannot continue to treat members of our baptized fellowship as adversaries. The division that yields “us/ them” thinking is doing no one any good. We are all in this together, “working out our own salvation with fear and trembling,” (Philippians 2:12), seeking a pathway that ceases to do harm to those with whom we disagree. If the mediation to this process tells us anything, it is that we must seek what is best for all and not just for those “on our side.” Second, we need to stop fighting over territory, property, and finances. All we possess and manage is God’s; if we separate, we must be willing to divide God’s assets in such a way that faithful stewardship may continue for all. Fighting over things will not take us to a positive future and will simply serve to damage our mission and ministry and provide a terrible witness to our world. Third, allowing a less-confrontational separation means that we stand a better chance of friendly transition. On our current course, we face the likelihood of irreparable damage and continued animosity. It is time for us to offer grace to all, to cease needless insult and injury, and to lay the groundwork for hope and healing.

On the other hand, we have failed to maintain a unity and an integrity. Relationships will change, we will experience the pain of losing loved ones, we will not see brothers, sisters, siblings, colleagues, and friends that are part of our family. The metaphor of divorce had been used in talking about the future of the church; the reality of such a step is painful, even when some see it as the only alternative. We will no longer be what we have been, who we have been. It has been very easy to focus on the ways being together has been difficult; now we will face the reality of losing all that has been good and gracious, wonderful and effective.

SOUL FOOD CONTINUED...

Transitions are always disruptive. Whether we are picking up the pieces and arranging them in a new way or beginning from scratch to build something new, a lot of time, energy, resources, and focus are involved. It will be a challenge for us all to maintain a vision and commitment to do God's will, serve the church's mission, and offer a transformative ministry to all the world. But I believe we can make the necessary changes with love and grace if we make the commitment to celebrate the holistic kin*dom of God as beloved community. We can do this whether we are together or working in new configurations, for we are still one in Christ Jesus.

In the coming months, as we process the Protocol for Separation and experience the decisions of the upcoming General Conference, our clergy and laity – and our communities of faith will be facing incredible and challenging choices. Who will stay and who will go? Who will leave all together and who will return? Not only “what will we do,” but “how” will be ongoing discussions. In times of immense and all-encompassing change there is great fear and anxiety, as well as excitement and anticipation. As we journey together through this momentous time, I would ask of every Wisconsin United Methodist the following things.



Pray. Pray for the church and its leaders. Pray for your own congregation, but also for all the congregations that will be impacted by these decisions. Pray for grace in all our actions. Pray for The United Methodist Church as it moves forward and pray for the new Methodist denomination and affiliates that will emerge. Pray for our global church – for our ongoing work of social justice, world-wide missions, and evangelism and witness – that will require our commitment and support to stay strong and vital as we work out our polity and practices for a radically new and different church.

Talk. Beyond talking to God, talk to each other. It is my prayer that all congregations will create space and time for the community of faith to come together for conversation, prayer, discernment, and honest exploration. People will have many questions, and while we may not have clear, specific answers, it is important that everyone have opportunity to express themselves.

Be reflective, not reactive. Our entire culture in the United States is suffering a time of cynicism, skepticism, suspicion, and ascribing negative intent. Reactivity makes us look for problems, to key in on what we don't like and what we disagree with. We wonder about ulterior motives and hidden agendas. I ask us all to make a conscious effort to work together for good, to see possibilities, and to prepare for a grace-filled, kind and compassionate way forward. Yes, there has been great hurt, there are things that have been done and said that cannot be taken back. But by God's grace it is time to leave the past behind and work together for a future that truly honors and glorifies God, that can allow space for effective and faithful ministry for everyone along the theological spectrum, and that creates fertile soil for healing, redemption and resurrection.



Is the Protocol of Reconciliation & Grace Through Separation the answer we have been looking for? Well, there is no simple solution to a complex and dynamic problem, but it is a way forward that allows us to move beyond the destruction of our disagreement and division, it is a hope that we can do less harm and that we can do more good, and it is a tangible and concrete challenge for us to work together to create a better, stronger future. This is my hope.

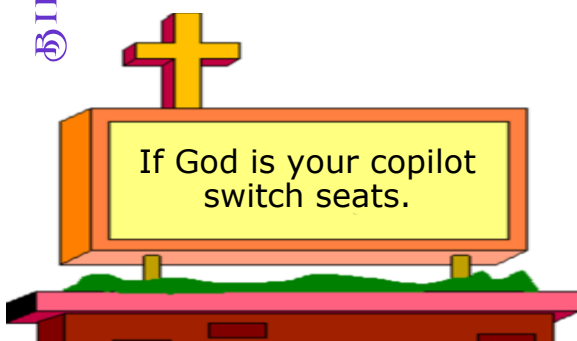

Fin addition, in February we will focus on a new mission project. The Rev. Christine (Young Seon) Kim, the director of Next Generation Ministries in Tanzania, has requested financial help for the construction of the Global Mission Secondary School (ages 12-18 yrs). Do to the distances students must travel this will be a boarding school and the construction of dormitories is essential. In addition the construction of housing for teachers and volunteer missionaries will be needed. Tanzania's school system is catered towards the wealthy. Less than 30 percent of students achieve secondary education, and the language barrier between primary and secondary education is much of the issue. The language of education for primary school is Kiswahili while the language of secondary school is English. Please see the February mission board for more details..
