

"Unity in the Body of Christ"

"Therefore, the prisoner in the Lord, beg you to lead a life worthy of the calling to which you have been called, with all humility and gentleness, with patience, bearing with one another in love, making every effort to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace. There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to the one hope of your calling, one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of all, who is above all and through all and in all." (Ephesians 4:1-6, NRSV)

COVID 19 led all our lives to change in many ways, such as all systems, institutions, and even personal lifestyles. As if we were imprisoned at home like criminal sinners, we should stay at home for about 80 days under government order. All buildings should be closed, such as schools, stores, restaurants, and even churches. We could not gather together in person. People should wear facemasks and keep social distancing 6 ft apart from each other when they go to grocery or public places. Like a tornado, COVID 19 blew up over us and broke our weak parts down socially, economically, politically, and spiritually. Many lost their loved ones, jobs, shelters, along with their peace and safety.

On the other hand, "Keeping social distancing" and the "Stay at home order" made us familiar with media and technologies. Somehow, social media led us to comfortable lives and individualist lives. Furthermore, COVID 19 seemed to lead us to go far from God with "no church gathering, and no Sunday service in the building" reasonably. However, we never lose at the spiritual war. We are still connected in the love of Christ. Through "Calling Tree" and the "Prayer Chain," we cared for one another. We were still dedicated and sent our gifts and offerings to sustain our beloved church. Moreover, we used social media to contact one another, to have Sunday service, and to have church meetings. We did a great job in the war of COVID 19!

Now, we need to be ready to gather together. It is time to think about the church. It is time to stand up and go along because we are the church that God called. The early church community also had a crisis moment, such as persecution from outside and division inside a community. The Apostle Paul says to them, "I, the prisoner, beg you to lead a life worthy of the calling to which you have been called." As Paul says, we have been called to the church of Christ. As in the past, the present, we are called to be one church. We should respond to God as a life worthy of the calling with all humility, gentleness, and patience, bearing with one another in love.

The Psalmist wrote, "How very good and pleasant it is when kindred live together in unity!" We are the churches that gather together in one church through God's calling. The call to Christian living is a call to unity of the fellowship of believers in love. We should understand that the love which unites the community of faith is, God's powerful love, for the call here to Christian unity in love is based ultimately on the singularity of God, and on the body of Christ. For the community of believers, life together unified by love is nothing more or less than the experience of the Holy Spirit's power.

The Apostle Paul says, "there is one body and Spirit, just as you were called to the one hope of your calling, one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of all and through all and in all. We believe that God is one, our savior Jesus Christ is one, and the Holy Spirit is also one. Paul says, "there is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male and female; for all of you are one in Christ Jesus" (Gal 3:28). Christian unity does not mean there are no differences or distinctions among members of the community of faith. We must see that whatever distinctions we recognize in terms of our talents, tendencies, languages, cultures, and capacities are legitimate because when they work together, they build up the church, the community of faith. Our Lord gave each of us whatever good gifts we have with the express purpose of harmony.

Paul says, "now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; and there are varieties of services, but the same Lord; and there are varieties of activities, but it is the same God who activates all of them in everyone." (1 Cor. 12:4-7) As Christians, we are called to a unified life of love in the power of the Holy Spirit for the mutual benefit of the entire church. I believe that God unifies us in the body of Christ. The church of Christ by the Holy Spirit works and grows in the unity of the faith.

As a body, the image of the church is familiar from 1 Corinthians 12, Paul identifies Christ as the church's head, and the church is the body of Christ. The head provides coordination for the whole body. According to the head's coordination, each of us builds up the church with unique gifts such as bricks, wood boards, glass, and even hidden small nails.

The church was begun by witnesses who saw Jesus Christ, who died on the cross, was resurrected, lifted to God, and maintained by those who believe in God through the Holy Spirit. If the early church community could not be together, scattered like sheep that had lost the shepherd, I wonder if the Good News could come to us in these days. They kept their faith in Christ, being together by the Holy Spirit.


Social Media indeed leads to useful lives. However, it makes us be individualists. Imagine that when family members are around a table, a wife uses a smartphone, a husband reads a newspaper, a boy plays a game with a computer, and a girl is watching TV without any conversation one another. What do you think about it? Even though they live in a house, but they do not care for one another. As God is the living God, the church is also the existing body of Christ.

If one believes in God and falls and goes away from God, who can help one? The Letter of Ecclesiastes says, "for if they fall, one will lift up the other; but woe to one who is alone and falls and does not have another to help." (Eccl. 4:10) God gave us the church community as the body of Christ because we are too weak to keep our faith alone. We should grow together up close to God. Let us equip ourselves for building the body of Christ with one another in love humbly because God unifies us in the body of Christ.

GIVING New Age, New Church June 2020

31but those who hope in the Lord will renew their strength, they will fly up on wings like eagles; they will run and not be tired, they will walk and not be weary. (Isaiah 40:31)

After Superstorm Sandy, my brother's church on Long Island became the center for recovery efforts in the Mid-Atlantic. 75% sustained damage to their homes; all had neighbors affected by the storm.

Today, we are in the midst of an unprecedented urgent response and recovery effort in which every church must be a center of recovery. Unlike a hurricane, earthquake, wildfire, flood or famine, the COVID-19 pandemic affects every person and every community worldwide.

As we return to church after quarantine, we should not fall into the trap of thinking, "How do we get back to the way we were?" Rather, we ought to ask, "How can we be a better church coming out of the pandemic, than we were going in?" Economic and emotional recovery is going to be a matter of years. What will your church do to help?

Each United Methodist should be discerning his or her own and their congregation's strengths; praying and preparing to join with a small group of congregants who will identify needs in the community/ nation/world. Then each group must create, fund, and carry out a plan to address those needs.

There will be children who have fallen behind in school. They will need tutoring and encouragement. There will be those who will have no job to which to return. They will need help applying for benefits, negotiating with banks, or getting enough food for their families. There will be people who continue to fall ill with the coronavirus. Fear and anxiety will continue to be widespread.

Prepare yourself for the times to come.

What Next? Sing and Dance

When the horses of Pharaoh with his chariots and his chariot drivers went into the sea, the Lord brought back the waters of the sea upon them; but the Israelites walked through the sea on dry ground.

Then the prophet Miriam, Aaron's sister, took a tambourine in her hand; and all the women went out after her with tambourines and with dancing. And Miriam sang to them: 'Sing to the Lord, for he has triumphed gloriously; horse and rider he has thrown into the sea.' (Genesis 1:19-21)



As we emerge from an eighth week of separation due to the pandemic, many people are growing restless and less certain than ever. When the Wisconsin Supreme Court rescinded the "stay-at-home" order, it caused many people to ask, "What should we do now?" Do we continue to stay in isolation? Do we return to the routines of daily work and social engagement? Can we go back to church? What are we to do?

First, I continue to offer the same advice I have offered all along. As Christian disciples and witnesses from our United Methodist tradition, we are guided by our General Rules: Do No Harm, Do All the Good You Can, Attend to the Ordinances of God (e.g., pray, worship, meditate, fast, share your faith, serve others). These are grounded in the Great Commandment: Love the Lord your God with all you heart, mind, soul, and strength; love your neighbor as yourself. So long as we care as much about our neighbor's health and well-being as our own, I believe we will make good choices and we will continue to practice physical distancing and care-giving engagement.

But we are also seeing a great strain on people's attitudes, behaviors, and mental health. What should we do about that? I believe there is strong Biblical support for two more spiritual practices during this endurance test of pandemic: sing and dance.

You may be thinking, "Bishop, that is crazy! We need to do something serious!" I simply reflect that when the Hebrew children were led safely across the Red Sea, they escaped slavery and oppression, but they faced a vast desert wilderness, full of danger, peril, and threat. Many began to reconsider whether running away was such a good idea. People got nervous. People got anxious. So, Miriam, sister of Moses and prophet of the Lord, took up a tambourine and led the women is dancing and singing. I want to encourage us to turn to music as we endure the ongoing health crisis. Music indeed "hath charms to soothe a savage breast," (William Congreve), but it also has great power to improve our moods, strengthen our resolve, and reenergize our weary spirits.

Many people use music to power through intense workouts because music can set a beat, a tone, and a rhythm that the body naturally responds to. Studies show that people listening to music during workouts can sustain their activity much longer than people that do not. And dancing is a wonderful form of exercise that everyone can do; it engages the entire body in rhythm and movement. Alternative studies show that people who say they cannot engage regularly in exercise find they can dance for extended periods of time, to a very similar benefit.

SOUL FOOD CONTINUED...

Scientists have shown that music, singing, and dancing increase dopamine (increasing pleasure, energy, focus, and awareness) and decrease stress hormones. It helps us sweat out toxins, and can generally calm, soothe, and heal frayed nerves and unhealthy emotions. I would not tell anyone what music to listen to, but I want to encourage everyone to adopt the practice of spending some time each day with whatever kind of "soul" music you listen to. My definition of soul music is music that makes your heart glad, that engages you body, mind, and spirit, inspiring you to sing along and even get up and dance. What kind of music you like is not important. My encouragement is that you find some time each day to shut down all the screens and tune into the music you like best.

Author Neel Burton says, "Music is the school and the hospital of the emotions," (Hypersanity: Thinking Beyond Thinking) and many of our battered psyches need some urgent care. Music is a gift to us, a blessed art that can inspire, comfort, and heal. Beyond the physical and psychological benefits, I want to remind everyone of the spiritual benefits. Throughout our Hebrew scriptures, especially in the Psalms, the invitation to sing out, to make a joyful noise, to dance in adoration and praise is prominent. At most times throughout the history of God's people, there were mighty challenges to survival. People did not know what tomorrow might bring. The news they heard was often frightening and threatening. The population of "have-nots" grew almost daily, with poverty, hunger, disease, and military oppression normal. And through it all, no one could take away the music. No one could stop the singing. No one could control the dancing. So, as we wait for the world to stabilize, listen to music, sing, dance, and you will find a new mind, a new heart, and a new spirit, filled with hope, peace, and joy!






