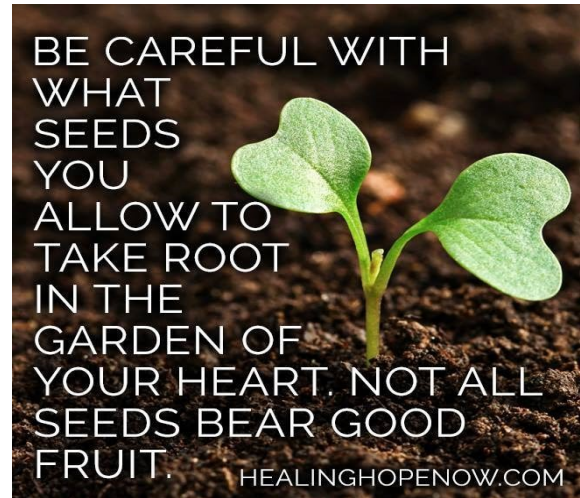

Be a Good Gardener”

Be a gardener.
Dig a ditch
toil and sweat,
and turn the earth upside down
and seek the deepness
and water the plants in time.
Continue this labor.
And make sweet floods to run
and noble and abundant fruits to spring
Take this food and drink
And carry it to God
As your true worship.

The medieval mystic Julian of Norwich describes the gardener’s life as a true worshiper in her poem. She sings of the gardener’s labor and effort to get fruits, and the gardener’s true worship through gardening. I am not a gardener, but I am enjoying gardening. I guess that you have probably experienced gardening at some point in your life. Through gardening, I learned about precious life and nature’s provision in God’s grace. Gardening is a means of grace for me to connect with God. Through gardening, I experience the purification of my spirit. And, I experience rest and healing through gardening. Perhaps, we all are gardeners for our spirit and mind. To grow in faith well by the Holy Spirit, we probably should give good care to our soul and mind as a gardener gives the plants good care.

When I moved to Wisconsin from Chicago, Illinois, I brought plants. Some of them are outdoor plants. I planted them around the parsonage. But, we had snow earlier last winter than I expected. I took one of the plants (wild sesame) inside the house and planted it in a small flowerpot to get the seeds before it died. Finally, I was able to get the seeds. In spring this year, I made a gardening spot and planted the seeds in that spot. And I watered them every morning and evening. I found a lot of sprouts on that spot about two weeks later. How amazing!

It is a mystery how the seeds become the plants. A small seed has life even though we cannot see it. The seeds seem to die, but when the seeds meet soil, water, and sunshine, life finally manifests into the world through the plants. To sustain the plant’s life, we should provide water when needed, and God delivers sunshine. Not only that, but we also have to protect the plants from weeds and wild animals. Even though a gardener works hard like “toil and sweat,” if God does not provide sunshine, the plants would not grow well, and although God may offer sunshine, if we do not work for a weed-free environment and water them, the plants will not grow well. Therefore, to sustain the plants’ life, the plants need God’s grace and human labor.

Like that, we may be a gardener in our own life. We should work hard to sustain our lives, provide good food and good care physically, spiritually, and emotionally the same way we provide good soil and water to our plants. Besides, we have to protect our souls, minds, and spirits from harmful environments the same way we try to make weed-free environments in our garden and protect our plants from wild animals. During gardening, I realized that if I skip watering my plants or do not look after my plants for one or two days, wild animals pick my plants off or disturb my garden. It affects me emotionally and spiritually. So, I try to give proper care to my plants every day because it is the way to keep my mind and emotions healthy.

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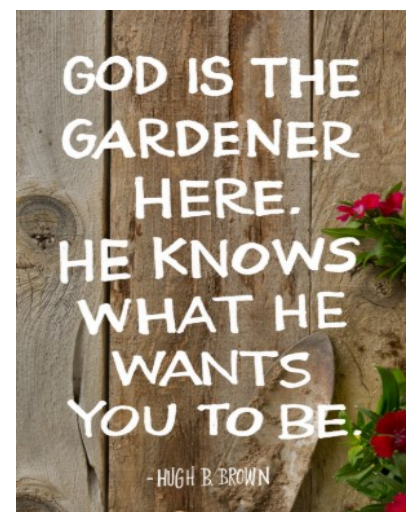
FROM THE PASTOR CONTINUED...

I encourage you to be spiritual gardeners who may “toil and sweat” to keep your souls and minds healthy. And, you may protect your soul and mind from bad thoughts and a negative mindset. You may take your soul and mind to God as a gardener carries the fruits to God for true worship. And, God may provide you grace at all times.

The apostle Paul saying, “prepare God’s people for works of service, so that the body of Christ may be built up until we all reach unity in the faith and the knowledge of the son of God and become mature, attending to the whole measure of the fullness of Christ” (Ephesians 4:12-13). As he says, we are perhaps still immature, which needs to grow to Christlikeness. So, we need good food and good care to be mature adults in Christ. As if a gardener takes care of plants providing water in time, we all need spiritual living water to grow in Christ well. As you may know, spiritual living water is Jesus Christ. I hope that you provide spiritual living water to your soul and mind. Jesus says, “If anyone is thirsty, let him come to me and drink. Whoever believes in me, streams of living water will flow from within him” (John 7:38). As if the plants die without water, our spirit also may die without the spiritual living water. So be a good gardener for your soul and mind and your physical body.

Resilience in Clay Jars

September 2020

But we have this treasure in clay jars, so that it may be made clear that this extraordinary power belongs to God and does not come from us. We are afflicted in every way, but not crushed; perplexed, but not driven to despair; persecuted, but not forsaken; struck down, but not destroyed;
(2 Corinthians 4:7-9)

There is much being written about the need for resilience in our home lives, in our churches, in our communities and in our institutions. Resilience is the ability to recover quickly from difficulties; think of the tree that bends but does not break. Clearly, the Apostle Paul had resilience in mind when writing to the Corinthians.

There are three things that I believe a resilient church needs:

1. Devotion to a vision of ministry and mission
2. Knowledge of the spiritual gifts of members and friends of the congregation (the “treasure in clay jars”)
3. Nurturing of gifts through spiritual disciplines of prayer, presence, gifts, service and witness.

In these pandemic times, we will need to discover and nurture resilience because, first, our affliction will not be ending any time soon. Until there is an effective vaccine that has been broadly implemented (2 or 3 or more years in the future), church attendance will be dangerous to members over 60 or those with chronic illnesses. Our churches must be resilient, second, because we are not going back to where we were. A mix of online and in-person worship, participation and giving will be the new normal going forward. Finally, we must be resilient because the newcomers we need to survive will judge us according to how we adhered to Christian values during the pandemic.

In all ways acknowledge God, and God will make straight your paths.

Our Pandemic Wilderness Journey

The whole congregation of the Israelites set out from Elim; and Israel came to the wilderness of Sin, which is between Elim and Sinai, on the fifteenth day of the second month after they had departed from the land of Egypt. The whole congregation of the Israelites complained against Moses and Aaron in the wilderness. (Exodus 16:1-2)



Most of us are engaged in a daily, ongoing conversation about the pandemic. Our response to the COVID-19 raises more questions than it answers. “How long will this go on? When can we return to our churches? Will we be back in time for Rally Day, for fall activities, for our suppers and sales, for Advent and Christmas? Aren’t our churches “essential” services? Can we go back if we follow all the guidelines and precautions?” These are all good questions, and none of them invite simple answers. As the Bishop, I am asked for my guidance, for my “ruling,” for my decisions. When we wander together in discomfort and uncertainty, we become desperate for clear answers, but in the words of Paul from the letter to the Philippians, we are “work(ing) out (y)our own salvation with fear and trembling.”

However, as your bishop, I want you to hear my reflections clearly and concisely, so you know my thinking and my recommendations. We are all working hard to journey faithfully through our wilderness so that ALL may emerge together in God’s promised land future.

- I am deeply grateful and appreciative for the hard work of our COVID-19 Task Force and all the resources and information they provide
- I am deeply grateful and impressed by the faithful leadership of our clergy and laity to find creative ways to continue in excellent ministry and service.
- I pay very close attention to health experts and the excellent information and instruction coming from the Center on Disease Control (CDC), National Health Institutes (NHI), and the World Health Organization.

At the same time, I want to acknowledge the pain, suffering, loss, and grief people are suffering by not meeting together in person. No one takes this lightly, and we are doing everything we can to return safely to regular church engagement and attendance. With this in mind, I give you my recommendations:

- Our guiding value and practice must be to preserve and maintain life, health, and well-being of our members and friends.
- We should err to the side of caution as a witness to our community and world that our love for our neighbors is one way we love God and all God’s creation.
- **Our clergy and laity should follow the strictest guidelines – including not worshipping in person – until the New Year.** All indications point to a very bad autumn and winter as we continue with COVID and enter the new flu season. No in-person worship is advised until 2021, and then only after thorough review and reevaluation.
- Setting a clear target date for reevaluation and return help provide clear communication and can avoid unnecessary disappointment. Clergy and laity leadership can then plan creatively for the fall, for Advent, and for Christmas. Perhaps we will join the Wise Men on their journey to arrive on Epiphany...

I want to emphasize that these are recommendations, but they are strong recommendations that I deeply believe to be good and appropriate. As Bishop, along with the entire cabinet, I will not prevent any church from returning to in-person worship before the New Year, as long as the highest standards of precaution are maintained and enforced. We realize that the worshipping reality of churches across this Conference are very different. There are places where safe reentry can happen much earlier than in other places. It is in consideration of the most vulnerable and at risk that we establish the start of 2021 as our target for safe return.

Historically, our Christian movement began in “house churches,” individual households where prayer, reflection on teachings, fasting, and singing occurred. Our current situation reminds us that sanctuaries, chapels, and cathedrals came later. Congregating, the way we have come to expect as normal, was a rare thing that we have come to value so much more for its absence. Regardless of our ability to be physically together, by God’s gracious Spirit, we are “one with Christ, one with each other, and one in ministry to all the world.” God will see us through this difficult time, so take care of yourself, take good care of your neighbors, and give thanks to God!

GRANTSBURG: CENTRAL NEWS

Central UMC will be holding in-church services Sunday's at 8:15 am. We hope these procedures will make you safe and feel safe. COVID-19 recommended safety measures:

1. Entrance and exit to the building will be through the southeast doors on Pine Street. Other entrances will not be available. Phased exit to keep social distancing will also be through this entrance.
2. All attendees, including staff and volunteers, will have their temperatures checked upon entry using a non-contact thermometer.
3. Protective facial masks are required for all attendees throughout the entire service— please bring your own mask with you. A small supply of masks will be available for those who forget or for guests.
4. Social distancing, six (6) feet intervals at arrival, seating, and departure will be observed. Families may sit together.
5. No hand shaking or physically passing of the peace.
6. No passing of items, attendance cards, sign-up sheets, offering plate, etc. Offerings can be deposited in offering box upon departure.
7. Singing may be possible wearing a protective facial mask. No Bible books and Hymn books can be used, but we provide info on a screen. Piano music will be provided.
8. Bathroom accessibility only through the door by the baptismal font.
9. All other areas of the church, including Wesley room, dining room, kitchen, nursery and basement, will be closed.
10. Hand sanitizer and disinfectant will be available.
11. No social time in church, no food or beverages will be served.
