
A Pastoral Letter from Bishop Jung

But if you had known what this means, "I desire mercy and not sacrifice", you would not have condemned the guiltless. (Matthew 12:7)

Daily, the news breaks my heart. A one-year-old child is killed by gunfire in Pittsburgh, sleeping supposedly safe in his crib in his home. In Atlanta, a shooting spree at three different spas leaves eight dead, primarily women of Asian descent, terrorizing residents in a year of anti-Asian violence fueled by "China virus" and "Kung flu" rhetoric and racist denunciations. The FBI reports over 3,800 acts of violence by whites against Asians and Asian-Americans, two-thirds of them against women in the past year. Over 20,000 Asian owned businesses have been vandalized or destroyed since March of 2020 in the United States. Most of these businesses have been longtime parts of their communities. I do not understand why violence is such an easy answer for so many, especially of those calling themselves Christian.

The gunman in Atlanta has been described as a devout Southern Baptist. An arsonist in California who destroyed nine Asian restaurants confessed he was acting as "a born-again Christian" opposing those he denounced with obscenities and racial slurs. This is not the witness we want to share with the world as Christian disciples.

I am personally reflecting on what our witness should be as followers of Jesus Christ. Of course, this is personal to me as an Asian-American and a leader in The United Methodist Church, but it is so much larger than my own response and the incident in Atlanta. When I think about what happened in Pittsburgh – and what continues to happen across our country and world - I am called back to a desire to be a peacemaker, working with people of all ethnicities, and cultures, and races to create a society founded upon principles of justice and mercy and equity. I believe that the people called United Methodists should be actively engaged champions of inclusion and justice for all. We should be FOR the love of Christ by standing AGAINST racism and oppression and marginalization and condemnation and violence.



Yes, first and foremost, we should be a people of prayer, but beyond our prayers we should be disciples sent forth "for the transformation of the world." We are God's agents and tools for transformation. God will achieve justice through us. God will show mercy through us. God will end human intolerance and violence through us. But not if we stand passively by.

The month of May is Asian Heritage Month. It is established to recognize and honor the great contributions Asian leaders and Asian cultures have made in our world. It is a time to celebrate the wonderful diversity within Asian cultures and to embrace this diversity throughout our global community. In most cases, Asian culture is deeply rooted in respectful relationships and communities of hospitality. Caring welcome, respect, and honor are core values of Asian people. I am prayerful that in Wisconsin we might find some substantial and creative ways to raise awareness, educate, and inspire our members to see the blessing of all Asian peoples.

Simply because our current pandemic began in Chinese geography does not mean it was caused by Asian people. Our entire planet has suffered COVID-19 – the pandemic should be our common enemy, not each other. We should work hard to support and encourage and strengthen all people through this global virus time, especially those most at risk and vulnerable. The pandemic has inordinately harmed the poor, the marginalized, the less educated, those considered subordinate by dominant cultures. This is the value system of the world; but it is not the value system of God's people. All are of equal value and should be treated as such. Those of us most advantaged should share abundantly with those who have less. And under no circumstances should we do anything that adds to the pain, anxiety, suffering, or harms the wellbeing of any other human being.

Please join me in prayer, but also consider joining me in action, to stand with those who are oppressed and attacked, and to witness to God's love in a broken and violent world. Let us show mercy to everyone, now and forever.

Active Discipleship in a Time of Pandemic



For it is as if a man, going on a journey, summoned his slaves and entrusted his property to them; to one he gave five talents, to another two, to another one, to each according to his ability. (Matthew 25:14-15)

As we quickly approach a full year under the cloud of the global COVID-19 pandemic it is a good time to reflect on what this past year has meant to us. It has been difficult, it has been depressing, it has been dangerous, it has been frustrating. The year has seen widespread fear and anxiety, illness and death, lifelong impact and family despair. It has kept us home, away from schools and churches, and restaurants, and businesses. It has disrupted sports and entertainment. It has created Netflix and Zoom addictions. It has not been a fun year.

Yet, it is too easy to simply focus on what we have lost, what we have missed, and what we cannot do. It is too easy to fixate on our personal inconveniences and annoyances. It is too easy to be overwhelmed by the health, economic, employment, environmental, and educational negatives. I want to shift the focus to applaud the amazing versatility, adaptability and creativity of our laity and clergy leaders in Wisconsin during this difficult time.

First, the use of the Internet, Zoom, YouTube and other platforms to offer worship, fellowship, learning, counseling, meeting, and support has been nothing short of amazing. Some of our congregations have actually grown during the pandemic by reaching new people in new ways. We have reconnected with shut-ins and those who have moved away. We are in many cases more connected and more productive than ever before. Kudos to the great ingenuity and innovation of our church leaders.

Second, the outpouring of funds and other resources to ministry has been incredible. Our Conference apportionments almost met their intended goal and we received the financial support faithfully that allows us to continue to do ministry across the Conference in each of our districts. I want you to know my appreciation for your faithful giving. And this extends to the local churches as well. Most report no significant decrease in local church support this past year. Thanks also to our United Methodist Foundation for the grants and aid they have offered through this challenging time.

Third, I am deeply impressed by the outreach ministry I am seeing in every area of our state. Support for homeless shelters, food banks, clothes closets, feeding programs, disaster response, counseling and domestic violence response, have increased almost everywhere. People are organizing responses and services for those lives lost in the pandemic, support for early responders, doctors, nurses, healthcare workers, assisted living and retirement home staff members. Church members have gotten organized and active for writing to their congressional representatives and the president, calling for pandemic aid, racial justice initiatives, support for ethical and effective law enforcement, media accountability, election reforms, and supplies for the most vulnerable in our country and world. Many of our Wisconsin United Methodists are more active in ministry during this pandemic than they ever have been before. I am seeing a wonderful shift from passive discipleship to active discipleship wherever I look.

So, I offer both encouragement and invitation – get active. Use your phone, your computer, the U.S. mail to communicate and organize. Attend webinars and online forums, many of which are seeking volunteers to make calls and help align resources to offer care for others. Connect with your own church people as much as possible. Make the commitment to focus on what you CAN do instead of what you can't. Ask God's guidance, individually and together, for ways you can engage in faithful service during this time of separation.

In times of difficulty, peril, and distress, it is more important than ever for the church to offer a faithful witness. Together, by the direction of the Holy Spirit, God can do great things with and through us. Let us rejoice in the opportunities we have been given in the days of COVID-19 to be God's hands, feet, and voice in the world. Well done, good and faithful servants! Grace and Peace,

7. Singing may be possible wearing a protective facial mask. No Bible books and Hymn books can be used, but we provide info on a screen. Piano music will be provided.

8. Bathroom accessibility only through the door by the baptismal font.


- 9. All other areas of the church, including Wesley room, dining room, kitchen, nursery and basement, will be closed.


