A STEWARDSHIP MESSAGE

Helping God's Kingdom Come About October 2021

(The Kingdom of God) "is like a mustard seed, which, when sown upon the ground, is the smallest of all the seeds on earth; yet when it is sown it grows up and becomes the greatest of all shrubs, and puts forth large branches, so that the birds of the air can make nests in its shade." Mark 4:31-32



My two children have received an allowance for doing chores from the time they understood the concept of money. We paid them allowances, not because they needed the money, but because we wanted them to begin to understand that money is something to earn, not to just ask their parents for. We also wanted to begin to teach them how to manage money.

The lesson was very simple. When they were little, every Friday, I'd grab 10 dimes and sit down with them. We'd first take a dime, grab an offering envelope, put their name on it, and slide the dime in. The second dime would be dropped in their piggy bank, which we'd take to the local bank every few months. The other eight would go into their pocket or purse for them to bring with to the store when we went.

I was once asked what difference those dimes given to the church really made. To which I responded, "To the church finances, I can't imagine anything. To my kids - more than I can explain. Every Sunday they put their envelopes in the offering plate with huge smiles on their faces. As they got older, when they made more money, they'd continue the same practice - along with reflecting on how they wanted to make a difference with their generosity. Would they give it all to the church? Would they give some to a mission or another non-profit that was making a difference?"

Watching them grow in generosity constantly reminds me that we all have a place in bringing about God's kingdom, whether what we have to offer is large or small. It's about the need of the giver to give, rather than the church to receive. Even a seemingly small act of generosity can grow into something beyond what we could ever ask or imagine.

Good is from God.

"Dear friend, do not imitate what is evil but what is good. Anyone who does what is good from God. Anyone who does what is evil has not seen God." (3 John 11)

I heard about a man who was unmarried. He had been traveling all around the country giving lectures on the "Ten Commandments for Parents." He fell in love and got married. After he had his first baby, he changed the title of his lecture to "Ten Suggestions for Parents." With the second baby, his lecture was called "Ten Helpful Hints for Parents." When the third child came, he stopped giving the lectures altogether.

This story gives us an idea of how difficult it is to live out what we talk about. Most people have the same issue applying what we believe and talk about to our daily attitudes and behavior. However, if we know the point of all teachings, it may be easier to live what we talk about. Let us find it out what the point is from Jesus.

Jesus went against God's Law. Jesus used to cure the sick on the Sabbath day. The Religious leaders taught that you should keep the Sabbath day if you believe in God, which means you shouldn't do anything. You should rest on the Sabbath day because it is God's command. However, Jesus worked on Sabbath day and said, "My father is always at his work to this very day, and I too, am working" (John 5:17). In this case, we wonder if God also didn't keep the commandment he taught us, "Remember the Sabbath day by keeping it holy."

The Christian tradition teaches us the Ten Commandments are from God. And we are trying to live them out in our daily lives. Yes, we should keep them. However, we wonder why Jesus is going against one of them, not keeping the Sabbath day. Jesus is not merely against one of the Commandments, but he just gives them a parable to teach. In Luke 4:31-37 and 6:6-11, Jesus healed illness on the Sabbath day. Jesus already established his authority over the unclean spirits, and he argued that it was right to do good and to save life on the Sabbath. Jesus' parable with this healing of a woman gives us Christians' importance in how we live the Commandments out. The Ten Commandments are based on God's love; it is not simply for keeping the rules. If we try to keep the law without love, we may make a big mistake. We need to be careful to understand what God tells us through the Scripture. The purpose of God's Ten Commandments is to protect those who are powerless in society, such as women, the sick, widows, children, and seniors. Many leaders had used God's law to rule over the weak and the powerless at that time.

Jesus healed a woman who was possessed by unclean spirits. As the traditional custom of Jews, a woman could not come to the front of people by herself. Furthermore, a woman or a man who is possessed by evil spirits was treated as a sinner. Nevertheless, Jesus called the woman to come in front of the people and proclaimed that the woman is free from her illness. Jesus teaches that concern over the suffering of fellow human beings takes precedence over obligations related to keeping the Sabbath.

The women's condition is attributed to a spirit of weakness. "For eighteen years, she had been bent over, unable to stand up straight." Jesus answered the synagogue leader by contrasting what one would do for an animal with what he has done for the woman. So, it gives us an implication that they may treat women worse than their animals. As Jesus mentioned the woman as a "daughter of Abraham," he confers a status of dignity on the woman. Jesus is in the process of releasing the captive, freeing the oppressed, and raising up children to Abraham.

FROM THE PASTOR CONTINUED...

We remember the story of a rich man who kept all the Ten Commandments from his childhood (Mark10:17-31). Jesus looked at him and loved him, and he said, "One thing you lack, go and sell everything you have and give to the poor, and you will have treasures in heaven. Then come and follow me." However, he did not do so because he had great wealth. The rich man kept all the Commandments in his life, but he could not give his property to the poor. He loved his wealth more than his neighbors. He kept the Commandments literally, not with his heart, his soul, and his mind.

Jesus taught us what the Greatest Commandment is for Christians in the Gospel of Matthew 23:34-40. "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with your entire mind. It is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: Love your neighbor as yourself." Who is our neighbor? They are perhaps those who are in need, the oppressed, the powerless, and the sick. If we are Christians, we should treat our neighbors as well as ourselves.

Go back to the teacher I shared with you at the beginning. The teacher taught the "Ten Commandments for Parents" before he became a parent. However, he changed his teaching topic to the Suggestion for the Parents, and eventually, he stopped teaching parents. We may assume it is not easy that we live out what we teach, or what we talk about. However, remember what the most important thing is for Christians. It is to love God and to love neighbors.

We are imperfect, and we cannot live out what we were taught and what we teach. Therefore, we need God's help. Jesus said to us, The Holy Spirit helps us to remember what Jesus taught us and guides us to live them out in the world. The way we ask for God's help is to pray to God. Through our prayers, God helps us to be strong enough to live out with the love of God and the love of our neighbors. Let us do good with all hearts and all minds, not literally or in tongue. Do your best as often as you can because good is from God.



Perhaps the most invisible part of Christian liturgy is walking. When we share liturgy in worship, most of the time we are standing or sitting, but there is walking, too. Arriving and preparing the heart for worship is done walking. Waiting for someone to read means we wait on another who is walking. Let's recognize how able-bodied our perspective can be, too—and ask those who traverse their days in wheelchairs or with canes to also serve in worship, and to make worship accessible as a way of walking together. Walking together means enduring together. Christianity is not a solitary enterprise. Now in a time of pandemic, journeying together as Christ's disciples means we

have plenty to endure. For a season, it seems, we are called to serve not in an unbroken sea of stability, but in the white-capped waters of instability. We are offering spiritual leadership in a time of pandemic, polarization, human migration, ecological instability, as well as in defining times for The United Methodist Church. Walking together may seem invisible, but it is a spiritual practice for we who share the practice of worshipping in community.

The way Mark tells it, the relentless widow walked her offering to the temple treasury. Jesus called his disciples to pay attention to her, not because the two small copper coins were enormous in value, but because her example, her endurance, was greater because she offered it despite her economic, social, and personal place of challenge. Luke's telling is longer and ends with Jesus saying, 'by your endurance you will gain your souls' (Luke 21:19). Jesus calls us to endure in ways that define our witness.

Regardless of our stances and locations, our opinions, and our histories, we are a community shaped by the cross that reveals a suffering God who can redeem and restore. We watch and pray for what God will

do. I trust the Holy Spirit will turn our divisiveness into fruit.

The relentless widow's witness and the power of walking together as a worshipping community reminds me of my season as a district superintendent in Wisconsin while Sharon Rader was bishop. Rev. Karen Ebert was one of my pastors and serving First UMC, Green Bay. Each week she offered the Pastoral Prayer in worship and those prayers were compiled in a book called, What I Tell My Heart. One of the prayers was for Advent and entitled, 'How Long, God?' It reads in part (See How Long God Image):

We endure as a praying community, finding words to bear witness to hope. We walk together without blowing away, like the relentless widow, as faithful spiritual leaders. These winds are momentary. Your walk may be humble, but it is not invisible. May we hold hands with a deep sense of trust and respect. Thank you for your faithfulness. Know that I am praying for you.

Some forces even seem stronger than can be borne.


How long, God?


