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## A STEWARDSHIP MESSAGE

Because our Giving is Worship ~ January 2021

You will be enriched in every way so that you can be generous on every occasion, and through us your generosity will result in thanksgiving to God. This service that you perform is not only supplying the needs of the Lord's people but is also overflowing in many expressions of thanks to God." (2 Corinthians 9:10-12)

God established a design for worshipping when God revealed to Moses the plan for the Tent of Meeting (aka Tabernacle). Central to that worship was sacrificial giving. God required gifts of animals and grain be brought to the Tabernacle to be sacrificed and offered to God because it was pleasing to God. These gifts were the first fruits of the agricultural work of the people representing a tithe (10%) of their production.

God knew that an institution like Temple worship would require resources to be sustained. We read in the Old Testament that the people's gifts of meat and bread, cooked in a way pleasing to God, directly provided food for the priests, guards, and caretakers of the temple and the spiritual leaders of the tribes. Sharing the fruits of the harvest became the large feasts we read about in Jesus' time.

In the modern Christian church, we maintain this pattern of giving designed by God. Now, people are called to give in a way pleasing to God: first fruits representing 10% of each family's productivity. Though, in modern times, it is money rather than agricultural produce.

These gifts to God, offered and dedicated in our worship services, are used to maintain the institution of the church by supporting its ministry and mission. This includes worship, Giving congregational care, spiritual development, hospitality & outreach, and missions by way of support for clergy and staff, building maintenance and other budgetary items.

> What we can conclude from this is that we give first because it is a gift pleasing to God. As a result of our giving to God in worship, we also support all aspects of the important work of the church.

### "New Wine into Fresh Wineskins"

"Neither is new wine put into old wineskins; otherwise, the skins burst and the wine is spilled, and the skins are destroyed; but new wine is put into fresh wineskins, and so both are preserved." (Matthew 9:17)

We have had a different holiday season from what we have had in the past. We used to decorate for Christmas, gather together with family members and friends, exchange gifts with one another, and have fun celebrating family traditions. But, mainly, we aren't allowed to gather with family members at this time because of the COVID 19 pandemic. Instead, we might see and talk with family members and friends via computer or smartphone. Some of you stayed alone. Some of you decorated your house as you used to do and still gathered together, but some couldn't. These circumstances make some of us depressed because we don't know how long it could go on like this. However, we should not feel down any longer. We should end all negative things and mindsets with the end of the year 2020. We have new beginnings to look forward to in 2021.

Sadly the COVID 19 Pandemic has not yet ended. It must be a long journey wearing masks and keeping social distancing even though we heard the good news of the upcoming vaccine. The Pandemic changed many things in our daily life. We miss the everyday life, which we did not feel grateful for because it was too normal such as fellowship with parishioners, hanging out with friends, enjoying a concert in person, and sharing meals with neighbors. We are sometimes confused about what normal life is. Somehow, home schools, home churches, and working from home might become the new normal in our daily lives. We have the new words of vacation such as staycation and work-cation. We cannot distinguish between vacation and work. It was as if we would rest in the restlessness. Perhaps, it was as if we hope in hopelessness and seek for the possibility in the impossibility.

Finally, we found new hope: a new normal life such as online services and meetings, and outdoor services, using new technologies. We had many thankful things, even in the difficulties in 2020. We could trust that God still works for us and the world. We could open our eyes and our minds wider to see a new era emerging. We could see what is happening in the world globally. Perhaps, much later, we descendants may study history about the two periods before COVID 19 and after COVID 19.

There were pioneers who had many risks and challenges in our history. One of the pioneers is Jesus Christ. In the 1<sup>st</sup> century, Jesus ministered, many people thought that the normal worship was to offer sacrifices to God such as lambs, goats, and doves in the Temple of Jerusalem. The place and sacrifices really were burdened to poor people. They should prepare taxes for the Temple, good quality sacrifices for offerings, and expenses for traveling to Jerusalem in order to worship God.

Moreover, corrupt leaders exploited people with several taxes. Finally, Jesus cleaned up the Temple first after the entry of Jerusalem. "Jesus found men in the Temple selling cattle, sheep, and doves, and others sitting at table exchanging money. So he made a whip out of cords, and drove all from the temple area, both sheep and cattle: he scattered the coins of the money-changers and overturned their tables. And he said, "Get these out of here! How dare you turn my Father's house into a market!" (John 2:14-16). It symbolized that released people from their burden, and Jesus will be the last offering of the sacrifice for all people's sins. No more exploited people, and no more burdened for people to worship God. However, no one understood Jesus' act. Instead, the leaders regarded that Jesus went against the leaders and God.

Jesus proclaimed a new normal age that to love your neighbor is to love God and that human rights are a priority before keeping laws. He said to people who asked why they did not keep laws. "Neither do men pour new wine into old wineskins. If they do, the skins will burst, the wine will run out, and the wineskins will be ruined. No, they pour new wine into new wineskins, and both are preserved" (Matthew 9:16-17). He sounded like to break the laws of God, but he said, "Do not think that I have come to abolish the law or the prophets; I have come not to abolish but to fulfill" (Matthew 5:17). It sounded strange because he seemed not to keep the law. No one could understand what he talked about at that time.

But, he became a good friend of the poor, the weak, the vulnerable, the least, and the powerless. We know that he opened a new era with the Good News. No other name to save us through. Only Jesus Christ is our Savior. Only Jesus' love is the remedy to reconcile humanity and the whole world. Jesus wanted people to love one another regardless of any boundaries as he loved people. Now, we may need to find a new fresh wineskin for a new normal age. It may be a new technology. However, we should remember, Jesus' love never fails or changes. Therefore, our new wine must be "love" as Jesus loves us.

## LET US SING A NEW SONG

O sing to the Lord a new song; sing to the Lord, all the earth.

Sing to the Lord, bless his name; tell of his salvation from day to day.

Declare his glory among the nations, his marvelous works among all the peoples.

For great is the Lord, and greatly to be praised; he is to be revered above all gods. (Psalm 96:1-4)



I am ready for a new song! I am tired of the old songs we have been singing in our United Methodist fellowship for the past few years. Even before the pandemic struck us in early 2020, our songs had not been of praise and jubilation, but of argument and division, injustice and judgment. And the world has heard us singing these songs. Songs of disharmony, disunity, discord, and dissonance – not the glorious music of people praising God.

For Christmas this year, I invite us to change our tune. Music is a powerful medium, and it has incredible potential for bridging and healing and renewal of body, mind, and spirit. Think for a moment of your favorite hymns and the carols and music that fills and thrills you. Are these songs of despair and unhappiness? Even the protest songs that call us to social and interpersonal action cast a positive vision for what might be. The people of God use song to offer gratitude, adoration, thanks, and praise.

When our songs turn sour and negative it is because we have turned from the divine light and wisdom of God (a historically and theologically accurate definition of "sin"). People overwhelmed by and engaged in oppression, people filled with loathing and contempt for others, people doing violence to others, people who do not know or understand compassion, mercy, and grace, cannot sing songs of joy and hope. It is only in returning to God's divine light (a historically and theologically accurate definition of "repentance") that our hearts are lifted and able to rejoice.



This is why we need Christmas. This is where we are reminded of God's plan for all creation. This is where we are reunited as one people under God — we all need the light of redemption and peace. Our human brokenness causes us to focus on the things we don't like, the things we don't want, and the people we don't want to love. The redeeming love of God, born in human form in Jesus the Christ, is our wake-up call to care more about other's needs than our own desires, to stop judging and condemning the people we dislike or disagree with, and to begin to live in alignment with God's unconditional love and unmerited grace for all people.

But we are the people of God the creator, the disciples of Christ the redeemer, and the body of Christ through the power of the Holy Spirit the sustainer. There is no place for disunity and discord within this Holy Trinity. So, the songs we will sing will need to be new versions of the old, old music of God. We will sing of joy. We will sing of hope. We will sing of justice. We will sing of healing. We will sing of love. Not solely because these are nice ideas we wish for, but because they are the truest expression of who we really are, who God created us to be.

I close this message with a word of thanks and a blessing. I thank you for your faithful actions during this pandemic year. I celebrate each one of you who faithfully wear masks. I celebrate each one of you who practice social distancing. I praise laity and clergy leaders who have protected God's precious people by not gathering inperson and creatively using resources and technology to worship, meet, and stay connected. I am grateful for the Christian concern and practice to do no harm, to do good, and to attend to the ordinances of God. It has been hard to be apart, but it has been right and proper and faithful to take these precautions. And now the blessing:

My beloved beautiful Wisconsin people, leave the past behind, forsake all thoughts and actions that cause harm, and clothe yourself in the blessed and divine light of Jesus the Christ. Sing a new song that God's glory may shine in and through you for all the world to see. Have a glorious Christmas and a bright and beautiful new year.


