

### **SCF SERMON**

### THE GIFT

The Scripture reading for today is from Isaiah 60:1-6. At first it seems an obvious reading for Epiphany Sunday, what with its references to camels, foreign countries, and gold and frankincense. But, it isn't a written as a prophesy of Jesus birth nor of the Magi bringing gifts of gold and frankincense to Jesus as a young child, although the reference is surely reminiscent of what happened centuries later. This particular scripture was written as a magnificent vision of Zion's future---full of light, prosperity and prestige. This text envisions a new beginning, a new life for the returning exiles. Isaiah 60:1-3 is flooded with divine light, "Arise, Shine; for your light has come." Verse 2 speaks to darkness covering the earth and the peoples; with verse 3 having nations and kings coming to the light of Zion. Verse 4 has the exiles returning to their home land, the children, grandchildren, and great grandchildren of the exiled people. Verse 5 refers to trade returning to Zion and the wealth of Nations coming to Zion. Camels from Midian and Ephah and Sheba shall come and they shall bring gold and frankincense.

If you continue on in Chapter 60 of Isaiah, it turns a little less glowing in that the vision for the new empire does not change the organization of imperial power. There would be zero intolerance for disobedience to the new system. In the new empire, forgiveness, compassion and redemption are only available to those who obey the rules of the new empire. So, what is the lesson to be learned from this text?

Martin Luther gives a profound lesson in how to wield power in society in his essay "The Freedom of a Christian". Luther maintains that all the riches of heaven are given to us in Christ, not so that we can subjugate others, but so that as Christians, we may take on the role of a servant. Luther urges us to deal with one's neighbor as God, through Jesus Christ, has dealt and still deals with us. Instead of domination over the weak, and power which enables the powerful to inflict revenge, power can free us to serve, heal, and provide resources not for our exclusive use, but for those less fortunate.

Isaiah's grand vision never actually came to fruition in history, although when Isaiah wrote this passage, Judeans had begun to return to Jerusalem, after being in

exile for 70 years. Likely, this poetry reminds people of God's desire to restore and rebuild the community. It would be a few centuries later that Jesus came along and some will say started to bring Isaiah's vision to fruition. Certainly Jesus embraced the values of loving and serving ones neighbor. And visions of camels coming from foreign lands bearing gifts of gold and frankincense during Isaiah's time and later when the Magi brought gold, frankincense and myrrh to a young Jesus got me to thinking about God's gift to all of us, that is Jesus, and the gifts the Wise Men brought, and the gifts we give to each other.

My Grandfather, Rev. Cecil R. Gaylord, was a Methodist pastor in northern Wisconsin, active in years 1925-1957 and appointed to mostly rural Methodist churches including St. Croix Falls, Eureka and Wolf Creek, from 1931-1934. Then, as now, he was assigned churches for three or four years and then was moved on. Grandpa was a supply pastor, assigned full time during the 32 years he was active with the Methodist church. During World War II, he was assigned to Elroy, Camp Douglas, and Union Center. From 1928 through 1930 he was preaching at Birchwood and Mikana churches, which are about 6 miles apart. I recently received a trove of historical information about Cecil and Lilian which a cousin has taken the time to organize electronically. I have a letter Lilian wrote to her parents when they were at Birchwood/Mikana, as young parents, of five children: Curtis, Joyce, Shirley, Stanton, and Lester.

#### **INSERT**

Dear Folks. Am trying to hold Lester till he goes to sleep so will drop a few words. So as to give typewriter a bit of exercise while Dada gone. Lester so cross needs a licking I think and then some. Yesterday afternoon Curtis and Joyce fooling me every once in a while so while I was upstairs they called and said someone to see me. They had a hard time getting me, [I went] down and I found a neighbor lady in, who is going away for the winter. She handed me a basket of blue grapes for the Mr. and family and put something in my hand for the Mrs. When she was gone I see it was a five dollar bill. So I took it down and paid for the stove. So that's that. I'll have that much to tell Cecil when he gets back. At the post office I got a letter from Mrs. Oftedahl at Mikana, wanting to know if It was alright if she and some of her family came over Wed. Eve, if nice. We had invited them some Sun. afternoon as they can't get away other days. She said if not to call her. I called her and told her Cecil was gone. She says "well well. Ain't I welcome anyway." I told her sure but thought that if Cecil was home they would enjoy it more. She says, "Well, we'll come anyway." Then last night about 7:30 it stormed something fierce and Joyce was so scared for Dad. Then I heard the awfullest honking of horns. I thought maybe the house was afire or the church, as there was an awful crash just before that. As I opened the door in drifted first one and then another, till the kitchen was full. Mr. Oftedahl says, "Well, why don't you say something?" Curtis says, "Ma, this is something funny, you'd better turn on the kitchen light." Then I come to I guess and realized it was a surprise party, and if I ever was surprised, it was last night. I usually smell it before hand but I was just swamped last night. They talked and laughed and then served chicken supper. Two cars turned back on account of the storm. Later on they presented us with a purse of \$12 and 50 cents. Ain't quite sure of the cents. It was \$12 tho. Joyce got a new dress and Shirley got one and Curtis got a shirt and Stanton a pair of shoes. Then there were some second hand dresses two or three, one I can fix for Joyce, it is very worn, but the other dresses are too short for Shirley but maybe I can fix them some way. Joyce's is cotton but Shirley's is wool. We had foodstuffs—cake, chicken, biscuits, sandwiches, cream and milk. I was so sorry Cecil was gone. But they said they had planned and were ready to come and couldn't call [it] all off. Well, I suppose he will have good feeds at hunky dory. I found a gunny sack full of potatoes an half a sack and another small one of carrots in the garage this morning. The small carrot sack was something like a flour sack.

Well, I guess this will do. Lester don't seem to want to sleep. He had a gay time last night. He wants to write to you's so here he goes: I like you Grandma. I like you Grandpa, so you had better try and come up to see me, both of you. From Lala.

He calls himself Lala. But if I say my Baby Boy, he says, No no, man, big man. Well, must get to work. Grandma Wisse and girl that lives with her invited themselves over for dinner.
