

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A STEWARDSHIP MESSAGE

To be a follower of Jesus means to be willing to sacrifice ourselves for the good of all. It means to be willing to deny ourselves for the benefit of all of humanity.

I recently read about a man named Thomas Cannon who did this in a truly remarkable way. He was a postal worker in Richmond, Virginia, who lived much of his life on the edge of poverty so that he could give to those in need. Describing himself as "a poor man's philanthropist," he gave away more than \$150,000 to people who were experiencing hard times, or who had been unusually kind or brave. He gave these gifts over the last 33 years of his life, mostly in the form of \$1,000 checks.

He traced his inspiration to his time in the Navy. While he was away at signal school, there was a shipboard explosion at the Port of Chicago and may of his shipmates were killed. He concluded that he was spared for a reason — to help others, to be a role model, to inspire people to see what he called "the oneness of it all."

Cannon gave to people of all ages, races, nationalities, and incomes. He gave to a low-income woman who started a youth center in her apartment complex . . . to a retired postal worker who was a regular volunteer at an elementary school . . . to a woman and a man who wanted to return to Vietnam to visit their hometown . . . to an advocate for the victims of crime . . . and to a teenager who had been abandoned as an infant but grew up to be named Virginia's Youth of the Year.

This generosity didn't come without sacrifice. Cannon supported his wife, his two sons, and himself and his charitable efforts on a salary that never exceeded \$20,000 a year. When he retired from the postal service in 1983, he and his wife lived near the poverty line on his pension. "We lived simply," he said before his death in 2005, "so we could give money away."

He wasn't unhappy about these sacrifices. In fact, he had a great sense of humor, one that he kept even after being diagnosed with terminal cancer. As his health was failing, he told the Richmond newspaper, "A Baptist deacon who owed me \$200 died recently. First thing I'm going to do when I get to the other side is run him down."

Thomas Cannon didn't want a foundation to be set up to continue his work after his death. He feared that a foundation would require a bureaucracy, and tons of paperwork. He didn't even what his name attached to anything. He just left one simple request: "Help somebody."

Are You Lonely?

⁴ even though I, too, have reason for confidence in the flesh.

If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh, I have more: ⁵ circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the Law, a Pharisee; ⁶ as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the Law, blameless. ⁷ Yet whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss because of Christ. ⁸ More than that, I regard everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, in order that I may gain Christ ⁹ and be found in him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the Law but one that comes through faith in Christ, the righteousness from God based on faith.

(Philippians 3:4-9)

First of all, I appreciate you all for allowing me to take a vacation. I had such a good time with my friends during while I was gone. We were happy to see each other again because we haven't seen each other in person for such a long time because of the pandemic. Last year, one of my friends had planned to come over to my ordination service in Sun Prairie, Wisconsin, but she couldn't come because, at that moment, her husband had a minor heart attack. Since then, she has taken care of her husband preparing special dietary meals, and so far, her husband's health has improved. We shared lots of stories about what we've been up to. Sometimes we teared up and sometimes laughed together. She would come with me to see what my ministerial fields looked like. So, we tested for COVID to make sure we were okay. As soon as we got a negative COVID test result, she booked a ticket. Finally, we came up to Wisconsin and spent two days together. She looked around the three churches I serve. Of course, she stayed in the parsonage with me. When I dropped her off at the airport in Minneapolis on Saturday evening, she said, "I knew you are happy ministering here in Wisconsin, because I could see it on your Facebook page. Nevertheless, I still worry about you because you are alone here and might be lonely. But I won't worry about you anymore because I see you are happy with your ministry and the people you are surrounded by. You already look like a person from Wisconsin." I said, "I feel I am a Wisconsinite."

After I dropped her off, I thought about who I was. Of course, I am a KOREAN, FEMALE, and PASTOR who lives in Upper St. Croix's area in Wisconsin. On the other hand, I am sure I am a foreigner, stranger, and marginal person in Wisconsin and the United States of America. Thinking of my appearance, someone may assume that I am not comfortable and happy to live in a rural area of Wisconsin. However, I am pleased because I am who I am, which means I love who I am. I love that I am a Korean and female, and especially a daughter of a farmer because I feel that here is my homeland. Also, I enjoy who I am, a foreigner, stranger, and marginal person in my current place because I have many things to learn and many people who welcome me and would be my friend.

If we accept that we are different and honor each other, we may live together at peace in a diverse world. We are all different even though we are siblings with the same parents because God made us all different, unique, and special. If we respect God's work on us, we should respect one another's differences and uniqueness.

The Apostle Paul had difficulty with persecution and rejection from Jewish, Gentiles and even early Christians because he believed in Jesus Christ. He was a Jewish Pharisee (teacher of Law) and religious and political leader of the Israelites. He was a wealthy Roman citizen who could travel everywhere at that time. He had received a higher education and could speak several languages. He said that he had many things to boast about. However, he didn't want to brag about them because all things were vain before God. He said, "I regard everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake, I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish in order that I may gain Christ." He could regard everything he had as vain because he knew Jesus Christ was the best value for his life. I love his attitude and faith in Jesus Christ. He was not afraid of anything, even persecution, because he believed that Jesus Christ was in him and he is in Jesus Christ. Above all, he was a person who was proud of being a Christian.

Again, I am a Christian and a family member of yours in Jesus Christ. No matter where I live and no matter what, I am with God, and you are with me. Wherever we are, we are connected through Jesus Christ's love. Therefore, whether we are alone or together, we abide with God. Are you lonely? If you are, please connect with God through prayer, reading the Bible and devotional books, and joining Sunday service and fellowship in the love of Jesus Christ. Enjoy Spring! 





Blessed are the Peacemakers



"Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called Children of God" (Matthew 5:9)

Siblings in Christ,

Some days the pain is so overwhelming that words are hard to come by. These are the times we are called to our knees. I write to invite you to pray that we might be fed by God's solidarity with humanity and consider our Christian duty to be peacemakers.

The core of Jesus' teaching is nonviolence, but that is not a passive route. Peacemaking seeks to actively bless our interdependence with unconditional regard for the neighbor. Jesus promises those who act as peacemakers will offer a witness that is so remarkable that peacemakers will be called children of God.

We have declared many times that we cannot condone white supremacy. The hate crime in Buffalo targeting our African American siblings, the hate crime in Laguna targeting Taiwanese people, the hate crime in Dallas against Koreans, and the gun violence in Milwaukee over the weekend, call us to our knees that we may ask God—what can we do to live as peacemakers? Why, in this country, is there a mass shooting of four or more *every day*? Let us be in prayer and more: call an end to the voices of white supremacy and systems that create violence. Children of God must pursue peace-making in this society.

Siblings in Christ, peace is not achieved by coercion, intimidation, or making persons an object of hatred. Peace is a gift of God that brings a measure of God's presence, a fruit of the Holy Spirit. Christians must love God enough to call for change in systems that embed racism. Christians must trust God more than assault rifles of the kind used in Buffalo. Christians must love God more than current solutions that are not working—can we love God enough to listen for the prophetic imagination that would allow the lion to lie down with the lamb?

There is no time to wait to advance the interdependent good of God's realm. Repressed demands for justice will not give birth to peacemaking. We need political change but more: to be fed by God's peace that you might make the prince of peace the cornerstone of your life, your church, and the unifying witness of compassion to your community.

We learn from the grief of racism hard truths about the body of Christ. Those who are vulnerable teach us that we have not heard their cries. We learn from this grief that proclamation of a nonviolent Christ cannot be muted. We learn through pain to grow in love. We learn again that personal holiness must involve social holiness.

This is not just a political issue, let's live an interdependent good where people make neighbors, change systems, and create a new axis of creativity centered on goodness. Know that I am praying for you.Peace,




