

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A STEWARDSHIP MESSAGE

GOD'S VOICE OCTOBER 2022

In my ministry, several people have asked why God doesn't speak to people like God did in the Bible. Their assumption is that any time Scripture talks about God speaking to someone, that person is hearing a literal voice saying words. I think this is a far too limited understanding of how God speaks to us every day. Consider this story told by Scott McKenzie and Kristine Miller.

"Every day, on her way to work, Audrey's route took her past a women's penitentiary. Surrounding the building and grounds stood a large chain-link fence topped off with barbed wire intended to keep separate those on the inside from those on the outside. Each time Audrey passed the woman's penitentiary, she saw the women walking the grounds or sitting at picnic tables soaking in a few precious moments of warm sunshine. As she passed, Audrey would quietly say a prayer for the incarcerated women and their families. One day, as Audrey was driving past, she felt a strong urge to pull in. Without fully realizing what she was doing, she turned sharply into the entrance of the prison. In an instant, she found herself face-to-face with a large, intimidating prison guard whose face suggested a humorless disposition. Feeling the awkwardness of the moment, Audrey explained that she had felt God's push to visit the facility and asked if they received volunteers."

"The prison guard responded by giving Audrey the business card of the volunteer coordinator and sent Audrey on her way. God's nudge had sent Audrey to an unfamiliar place, and she was courageous enough to go. Soon she started a Bible study class at the prison sharing Jesus' message of love and hope."

Audrey believed that the urge to pull into the penitentiary was God speaking to her. I tend to agree. Rather than waiting for a literal voice to speak to us, what if God spoke and called us through our nudges, yearnings, and hopes. That would mean that God is closer than many of us think or realize. It also means that God challenges us more frequently than we realize. But, when we courageously listen to God with a willing heart, we will discover that the result is transformational, not just for us, but for everyone whose life is impacted.

"Do No Harm!"

"For you were called to freedom, brothers, and sisters; only do not use your freedom as an opportunity for self-indulgence, but through love become slaves to one another. For the whole law is summed up in a single commandment, "you shall love your neighbor as yourself." If, however, you bite and devour one another, take care that you are not consumed by one another." (Galatians 5:15)

"Hey, Jenny! Do you have flowering plants in your garden?" Someone who knew I enjoyed gardening asked me. "Well, yes, I do," I said. "I started a flower garden last year, but it didn't go well. I hope it goes better this year." As I do with my vegetables, I watered my flowering plants every morning, hoping they would flower this year. For weeks on end, whenever I had time, I would run to my flower garden to look at them to see if they were blooming yet. Finally, I have flowers in my garden. I was so happy to see them. Now I catch myself smiling when I'm on my way home, as I look forward to seeing my garden.

One day, while I was drinking a cup of coffee on my deck, looking at the flowers, I suddenly noticed that the lawn around the garden looked brown, like the grass was dying. It looked horrible. I felt bad, and I thought if the lawn were a nice green color, my flowers would look better. I grumbled about the grass to myself. It seemed weird because the lawn turned brown only around my flower garden. The next morning, I tried to water my flowers and walked through my lawn, bringing the water hose. Then I looked closely at the lawn around the flower garden. "Oh my Gosh!" I was so surprised. The area of the lawn that was brown was the path that I walked every morning to water my flowers. I realized that I was the one who damaged the lawn unknowingly and then complained about it.

Similarly, we may unknowingly cause harm to others, and we may judge them and what they do. Let us look around and make sure we aren't causing harm because we are too self-focused on what we are passionate about, and therefore, we are missing opportunities to help and guide the people around us. By being more aware, we will do no harm to anyone, not even ourselves. John Wesley, the founder of Methodism, suggested three simple rules Christians should keep: Do No Harm, Do Good, and Stay in Love with God. Most of us might experience the struggle to resolve complex and difficult issues in everyday life. And then, when we try to resolve the issues, it may cause harm to others or ourselves knowingly and unknowingly. However, if we keep the first simple step in our mind every moment, it leads us to a safe place to stand while the hard and faithful work of discernment is done. When we agree that we will not harm those we disagree with, conversation, dialogue, and discovery of new insight become possible. And then, "We can do everything in Jesus Christ, who empowers us" (Philippians 4:13).

Sometimes we wonder if it is possible to live in this complex and violent world without doing harm, if we should turn the other cheek to those who distort the truth by selective use of the facts of any given situation, if it is wise to do no harm to those who seek to harm us, our future, or our reputation, and if it is possible to speak the truth in love and gentleness when others seem to speak partial truth in anger and hatred. We face challenging moments on every path we walk. But, think of Jesus, his life, and his teachings. We are not alone. Every moment Jesus is there for us. Wesley said we are on the way to salvation, living in harmony with God, "by doing no harm, and by avoiding evil of every kind" (The Book of Discipline, 103).

Sometimes we cannot trust ourselves because we often lack grace and understanding. Frequently we do wrong and make matters worse. We make excuses for ourselves but condemn small things in others. Therefore, we should open our hearts, minds, and doors so that God can work in us, among us, and between us. If you are open, you will notice God's works around you in small ways. It can sometimes be something as simple as a soft blowing wind, a shiny leaf seen in the sunshine, an unnamed flower in the field, your child or grandchild, and even your companion. In daily life, you may suddenly realize that God works for you. My gardening experience reminded me of how amazing God's grace is and how God takes care of all of us with his steadfast and fair love. If we focus on His Word and His grace, we can all achieve our goals and do no harm. I watered my garden and the lawn was damaged, and the lawn has recovered even though it took some time. Let us do no harm so that we can make a better tomorrow.



WORLD COMMUNION SUNDAY

October 2nd is World Communion Sunday. On the first Sunday in October, United Methodist congregations join many Christian churches across the globe in celebrating World Communion Sunday. World Communion Sunday began at Shadyside Presbyterian Church in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania in 1933. The Rev. Hugh Thompson Kerr and his congregation sought to demonstrate the interconnectedness of Christian churches,

regardless of denomination. Rev.



Kerr appropriately chose the sacrament of Holy Communion to symbolize this unity. In 1940, the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America, which included all of the predecessor denominations of The United Methodist Church, adopted World-Wide Communion Sunday. United Methodists believe in an open table, anyone may receive communion. Our Book of Worships says, "All who intend to lead a Christian life, together with their children, are invited to receive the bread and cup." In United Methodist Churches around the world, a special offering is collected on World Communion Sunday to fund scholarships for seminarians. One half of the proceeds is for World Communion Sunday Scholars administered by the General Board of Global Minis-tries. The remaining one half is for the Ethnic Scholarship Program and the Ethnic In-Service Training Program, which are administered by the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry. Special Offering Envelopes will be provided for this offering.





Make Room for Mending

"Think of us in this way, as servants of Christ, and stewards of God's mysteries."

—I Corinthians 4:1



Siblings in Christ,

I write from Karlsruhe, Germany, working here with the World Council of Churches, the Ecumenical Forum for Korean peace. I led a bible study on Joseph and his brothers on how the biblical imagination might open the door for reconciliation and forgiveness. I was moved by the Spirit's power to bring the world together with concern for peace and touched by how long my people have suffered.

It has me thinking of you, my beloved in Wisconsin, the disunity, the divisiveness, the appointments being de-stabilized, but also the Spirit's majestic power. We know our God is the one mending brokenness in our personal walk with Jesus and our collective ministry as an annual conference—and as a people who are servants and stewards of Christ in a broken world.

When I told my cabinet that I was praying about new superintendents last January, I said, 'life is about making room for others.' Who is not at the table? What are the threats and opportunities before us? Joseph made room in his heart for his brothers and for a newness between them. They share a common father who is still alive in their thinking and action. Some at the table need to make room. Some need to share service. All of us are stewards of a mutual garment of destiny, of a Kingdom of mutual benefit in Christ.

The Christian faith is going through a period when we no longer represent the establishment, but due to secularization, we are increasingly a people who have been disestablished. Yet, Jesus is there among the disestablished, among those crucified on the edges, and our movement will be refined and strengthened when we do not expect popular members of the establishment to proclaim the gospel for us, or for democracy to make one religion safe over others. We were always meant to be in solidarity with the disestablished by following Jesus there.

Life is about making room to be servants of Christ and stewards of God's mysteries with no guarantee that it will be easy. Rather, when we are sent with difficult ministry ahead, we are promised by the risen one, 'Lo, I am with you always, even to the close of the age.'

When we are touched by the healing of the Holy Spirit, we walk with an authentic embodiment of the incarnate one. Practical divinity has no room to speak ill but rather to edify and build up the body. The Kingdom is always marked by the newness of making room in one's soul for the stranger Christ presented to us. Let us open that door and with it, be open to tones of harmony, reformation, and solidarity with wherever the prince of peace leads. The mission is outward and self-giving if we will be servants of Christ.

Dear Ones, I am so grateful for your ministry. Know that I am praying for you.



HALLOWE SAFETY TIPS

Each year, poison centers from around the country manage numerous exposure cases involving Halloween-related substances, such as candy, glow sticks, and special cosmetics. Here are some simple precautions adults can take to help avoid poisonous exposures and ensure that children have a safe holiday:



DRYICE

Handle dry ice properly and carefully. Oral/skin exposure or ingestion of dry ice can cause significant damage. Do not store dry ice in the freezer or an unventilated area.



COSMETICS

Test face makeup in a small area of skin first (preferably on the arm) to check for allergic reaction before applying it to the face. Avoid decorating the face or body with products that aren't intended for the skin.

Throw out any makeup that has a very bad smell; this could be a sign of contamination.





CANDY & TREATS

Inspect all candy for any signs of tampering (tears, pinholes, discoloration, etc.) before eating or allowing children to eat.

Check all candy and edibles for choking hazards.



GLOW STICKS

Remind children not to chew on or break open glow sticks or any other glow-in-thedark products.


