A STEWARDSHIP MESSAGE

A Note in the Offering September 2022

A young child wrote this note to his pastor. "Dear minister, I'm sorry I don't give more money to the church on Sundays, but my father didn't give me a raise in my allowance. Could you give a sermon about a raise in my allowance? It would help the church get more money."

As funny as this is, many of us approach giving in this way, whether it's to the church or to any other organization that helps those in need. We'd give more if only we had a little more to give. We just need that raise and everything will be so much easier. There's only so much to go around and there's just not enough right now.

Unfortunately, this paints a false picture of God. Our world tells us over and over those resources are scarce. There's only so much to go around. And so, we can only give so much because otherwise there won't be enough left for us. We spend so much time and energy acquiring and worrying about what we don't have and often are so measured and cautious with what give, because we believe there isn't going to be enough. This is the myth of scarcity. That God hasn't given his children enough to go around. This is not the God we worship.

The truth is, we believe that the God we worship has given to us abundantly! Not only is there enough to go around, but there's also more than enough. And therefore, we give in response to the abundance God continually provides us with.

I have heard people say that the more they have given the more God has given them. From my experience, I don't think God gives more to the generous and less to misers. I have found that the more I give the more I recognize how much God has already blessed me with. It's not that God has given me more in a "quid pro quo" arrangement. In giving, I am transformed. I can see the gifts I have more clearly. I can give thanks more fully. I can give more joyously.

Thank God for the many abundances he has given to us!

“You are Never too Late!”

*Then he said, “Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom.”
Jesus answered him, “I tell you the truth, today you will be with me in paradise.”
(Luke 23:42-43)*

There was an earnest prayer of a mother, who would love to know about God, however, never had any opportunity for it. When I invited her kids to the confirmation class, she asked me if she could join in the class along with her kids. The mother said, “I grew up in a non-Christian family. I never had a chance to take a confirmation class while my friends did. I wish I could study about God and be baptized together with my two kids. But I wonder if it is too late for me to take a confirmation class.” I said to her, “No, you’re never too late. It is the perfect time for you to start the confirmation class. If you want, please come and join the class with your kids.” They took the class for one year and received baptism together on August 21, 2022. The mother shed tears when she received baptism. What an amazing moment!

I met them when I first moved to Grantsburg, Wisconsin. It was ‘National Night Out, 2019.’ I didn’t know anyone in the community yet. I went out to see how people were doing and what the ‘National Night Out’ was. I was a stranger who didn’t know anyone around me or the community. There were many people at the Grantsburg Fire Department for that event. I was standing outside of the Fire Department, lining up for dinner, and I heard someone call me, “Hello, Pastor Jenny!” I was pleased to meet someone who knew me among the crowd. She was one of our parishioners. I walked into the building with her. After eating dinner, we had a chance to ride the Fire Truck with several children. I met them there, a girl and a boy. We rejoiced riding the Fire Truck, shouting, singing, and dancing on the truck as if I was a child like them, and I invited them to Sunday School. We didn’t have Sunday School at that time. But, I thought we can start Sunday School with them. We began Wednesday Church School, ‘Go Fish’ with them. They were in 5th grade and 6th grade at that time. They consistently attended the church school, ‘Go Fish program’ with other kids, but once the pandemic hit, we suspended the church school programs.

When we reopened our church school in 2020, they became youth. We began a youth program with them. They consistently attended youth programs with the other youth. Last year, I invited them to confirmation class, and I noticed they hadn’t received baptism yet. I invited their mother to consult about confirmation and baptism. Their mother wanted to take the time to consider their baptism and confirmation. I knew that the person I met at the National Night Out had a good relationship with the mother and their family, like a spiritual mentor. She and I consulted and prayed together for their family.

One day, the mother called me and said she would like to attend the confirmation class with her two kids because she would love to receive baptism with her two kids after finishing the class. I joyfully invited her and her two kids to the confirmation class. While they were taking the class, they struggled several times to follow up completing assignments, or community service. The mother felt bad and thought they weren't going to successfully complete the class. But whenever they struggled, their mentors and I prayed together and encouraged them to continue. Finally, they completed the class and received Baptism and Confirmation together, as a family. What a wonderful moment! How amazing grace is!

Like the mother, you are never late. It is never too late to start something. If you hesitate to start anything, know it is the right time for you to begin a new journey. Remember the criminals who were crucified with Jesus, one on his right and the other on his left? The one caught his last chance while the other missed it. Don't miss your chance to catch God's grace. God is always near you, waiting for you.

DEVOTIONAL



While many think a prophet is someone who predicts the future, the prophets that populate our scripture come from an ancient tradition born of the Hebrew term, ‘navi’ or ‘seer.’ A prophet like Amos, Jeremiah, or Isaiah has a profound capacity to see through the pretenses of our faith practice and the harmful ways half-measures impact the orphan and widow. It would be easier for us to talk about some future, but this lection for Sunday wants us to grapple with Isaiah’s vision for Jerusalem and Judah and the ways that vision cuts through the underbrush of falsehood that is the shadow side of human worshipping community.

In a surprising turn, God is weary. “I have had enough of burnt offerings of rams,’ (Is. 1.11). ‘I am weary of bearing them,’ (Is.1.14). Festivals and offerings with blah blah blah instead of justice is beyond wearisome. The prophet wants us to know we will live with the consequences of the injustice we perpetuate.

The prophet calls us to an alternative consciousness that is starkly different than the culture around us. The conventional wisdom of our systems has not centered the orphan and widow: ‘learn to do good; seek justice, rescue the oppressed, defend the orphan, plead for the widow. (1.17).

Isaiah uses the imperative voice in v. 16: ‘wash yourselves!’

There is a humility in washing. We get up and move and bring our hands to the source. Early in the pandemic the counsel to wash hands was an occasion to remember our baptism and our link with the baptized, as well as the God of all creation. Water is a resource that demands our stewardship and sharing.

The water never dries on our baptism. The need to surrender to our baptism in Christ never ends. Reflection on our baptism can be formative—and reveal who we are in relationship to the vows we make. Perhaps it could be said that in the Holy Spirit, our baptism is new every moment—as new as water is—and as new as our need for washing is.

Is worship in your faith community wearying? Is your own participation wearying? How might justice come from worship or how might your faith community impact the orphan and widow? Does it matter if the orphan or widow was born in Mexico? Where are the orphans and widows in your community? How might your eyes be washed to renew your practice of faith? Come to the source and wash.

Know that I am praying for you. I look forward to sharing reflection on my early summer pilgrimage to Camino de Santiago with you.

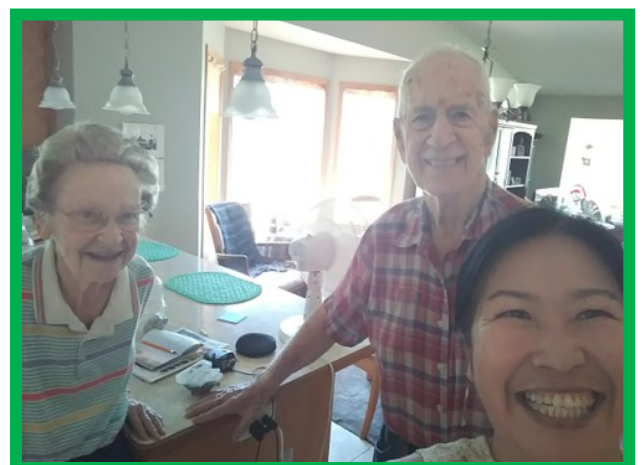

WHY DO WE CELEBRATE LABOR DAY?

THE FIRST LABOR DAY WAS SEPTEMBER 5, 1882. PLANNED BY THE CENTRAL LABOR UNION, OVER 10,000 WORKERS MARCHED THROUGH THE STREETS OF NEW YORK CITY. THEY ORGANIZED THE EVENT TO DEMAND BETTER RIGHTS FOR WORKERS.

ON JUNE 28, 1894, THE US CONGRESS PASSED AN ACT DECLARING THE FIRST MONDAY IN SEPTEMBER OF EACH YEAR AS THE LEGAL HOLIDAY, LABOR DAY.



THE INDUSTRIAL REVOLUTION DURING THE 1800S SPARKED THE DEMAND FOR BETTER WORKING CONDITIONS. THE TYPICAL US WORKER USED TO WORK 12 HOURS A DAY, 6 DAYS



A WEEK. IN SOME CASES, CHILDREN AS YOUNG AS 5 WERE WORKING IN FACTORIES.



ON LABOR DAY, AMERICANS CELEBRATE THE CONTRIBUTIONS, AS WELL AS, SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC ACHIEVEMENTS OF THE US WORKFORCE.

LABOR DAY HAS GROWN TO BE REGARDED AS THE UNOFFICIAL END OF SUMMERTIME. MANY PEOPLE CELEBRATE WITH PICNICS, BBQS, PARADES OR FIREWORKS. THERE'S ALSO AN OLD FASHION RULE THAT SUGGESTS NOT TO WEAR WHITE ONCE SUMMER ENDS ON LABOR DAY.

Check or install weather stripping at doors, caulk around windows, adding storm windows or window films when applicable.



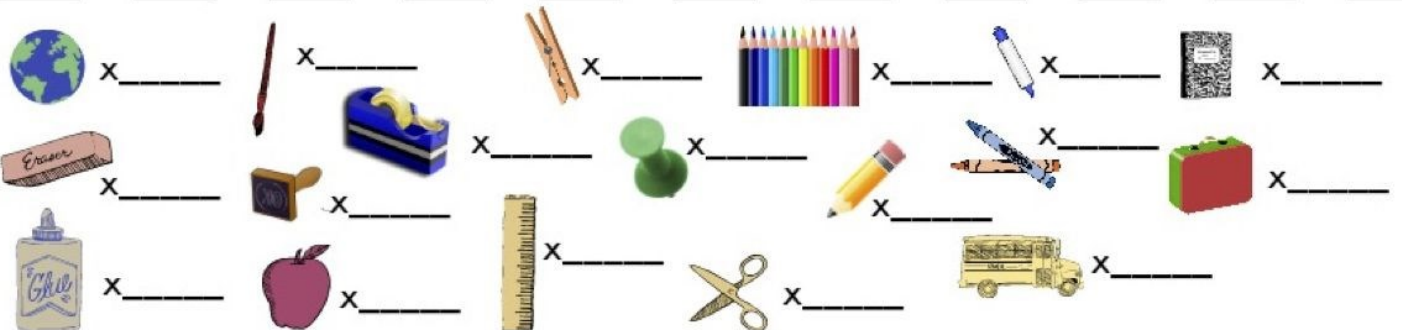
Open curtains and blinds to let sun in through windows to help heat your home and shut them at night to retain heat.
