

God's Abundance October 2023

Parker Palmer, a Quaker theologian, once told a story about abundance. Palmer was a passenger on a plane that pulled away from the gate, taxied to a remote corner of the field and stopped. You know the feeling: the plane stops and you look out the window and see that you're not on the runway, the engines wind down and your heart sinks. The pilot came on the intercom and said, "I have some bad news and some really bad news. The bad news is there's a storm front in the West, Denver is socked in and shut down. We've looked at the alternatives and there are none. So we'll be staying here for a few hours. That's the bad news. The really bad news is that we have no food and it's lunch time." Everybody groaned. Some passengers started to complain, some became angry. But then, Palmer said, one of the flight attendants did something amazing.

She stood up and took the intercom mike and said, "We're sorry, folks. We didn't plan it this way and we really can't do much about it. And I know for some of you this is a big deal. Some of you are hungry and were looking forward to a nice lunch. Some of you may have a medical condition and really need lunch. Some of you may not care one way or the other and some of you need to skip lunch. So, I'll tell you what we're going to do. I have a couple of bread baskets up here and we're going to pass them around and I'm asking everybody to put something in the basket. Some of you brought a little snack along – something to tide you over – just in case something like this happened, some peanut butter crackers, candy bars. And some of you have a few LifeSavers or chewing gum or Rolaids. And if you don't have anything edible, you have a picture of your children or spouse or girlfriend/ boyfriend or a bookmark or a business card. Everybody put something in and then we'll reverse the process. We'll pass the baskets around again and everybody can take out what he/she needs.

"Well," Palmer said, "what happened next was amazing. The griping stopped. People started to root around in pockets and handbags, some got up and opened their suitcases stored in the overhead luggage racks and got out boxes of candy, salami, a bottle of wine. People were laughing and talking. She had transformed a group of people who were focused on need and deprivation into a community of sharing and celebration. She had transformed scarcity into a kind of abundance."

After the flight, which eventually did proceed, Parker Palmer stopped on his way off the plane – (deplaning), and said to her, "Do you know there's a story in the Bible about what you did back there? It's about Jesus feeding a lot of people with very little food." "Yes," she said. "I know that story. That's why I did what I did." Even amid what we think is scarcity, many time God has already given us what we need.

### "What Would Jesus Do?"

"I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this, everyone will know that you are my disciples if you have a love for one another." (John 13:34-35)

Every year when October comes around I am excited and a little nervous for Laity Sunday. We show God what we did in His ministry for the last year on Laity Sunday. We present what we did and see how God blessed us in our ministry. Laity Sunday is on October 22<sup>nd</sup> this year. Please come and join us in celebration of our ministry!

Laity Sunday calls for the church "to celebrate the ministry of Christians of all ages in the home, workplace, congregation, community, and world" (*the Book of Worship*). The United Methodist Church, especially North America's Methodism, was begun by lay ministers. John Wesley, Founder of Methodism, sent lay ministers to America. Lay ministers, often called "circuit riders," were sent to preach wherever people gathered. Some of our parishioners' ancestors might have been circuit riders. Without lay ministers, today's Methodists couldn't exist.

We do appreciate everyone's ministry. We build the church together and work on God's mission together. Mainly, I appreciate our church leadership for your wonderful ministry. What a wonderful day to celebrate the UMM and UMW ministries and recognize lay servants in our parish and the missions we work for locally and globally!

I want to share a story. There was a pastor named Henry Maxwell. One day, a man came to pastor Henry, asking for help while preparing for his Sunday sermon. The man was laid off from his company and lost his home. After the pastor listened to the man's helpless situation, he brushed him away and closed the door. On Sunday, the same man appeared in the church at the end of the sermon. He approached the open space in front of the pulpit and faced the people. No one stopped him. He quietly confronted the congregation. He said, "I am not complaining, but just stating facts." He addressed his situation and that of many workers like him. When he finished his address to the congregation, he collapsed and died a few days later. That following Sunday, Pastor Henry, deeply moved by the events of the past week, presented a challenge to his congregation: "Do not do anything without first asking, 'What would Jesus do?'" This question, "What would Jesus do?" challenged many people, and their lives were completely transformed. It is a classic Christian story written by Charles Monroe Sheldon. The full title is *In His Step: What Would Jesus Do?* 

# FROM THE PASTOR CONTINUED...


We are sometimes challenged to follow Jesus, being a disciple of Jesus Christ, even though our mission statement is "Making disciples of Jesus Christ in all generations [nations]." Have you ever thought about what the disciples of Jesus look like? If I say "the disciples of Jesus Christ," you may imagine the disciples of Jesus in the book of the Gospel. You may think of the twelve disciples of Jesus Christ in the Bible. But what I actually mean is, "us." We are disciples of Jesus Christ, aren't we? Let us figure out what being disciples of Jesus means. Disciple means a dedicated follower of Jesus. If you are the faithful followers of Jesus Christ, you are a disciple of Jesus. The book of the Gospel John 13:34-35 says, "I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this, everyone will know that you are my disciples if you have love for one another." So, if you love one another, you are one of the disciples of Jesus. Even though you don't walk around saying, "I am a disciple of Jesus Christ," everyone may know you are Jesus Christ's disciple by how you love others.

Like the story, it is easy to say "love." However, loving in the act isn't always easy. "Love is not just a feeling. It's an action. It's demonstrable. It's noticeable" (*They Will Know Us by Our Love*, p.5).

Love cannot be hidden. Even though the person you love cannot recognize your love now, God knows about you and your love. Love cannot hide from God and others. Our prayers sometimes take longer than expected, but God never forgets your prayers. God becomes real to us by love. Love in your actions for others. Love with your hands and feet. Your loose coins can feed hundreds of people in poverty. The clothes and blankets stacked in your closets or storage can help hundreds of people in need. Every moment you face challenges, think, "What would Jesus do?" God will guide your way to becoming one of his disciples.





October 1st is World Communion Sunday. On the first Sunday in October, United Methodist congregations join many Christian churches across the globe in celebrating World Communion Sunday. World Communion

Sunday began at Shadyside Presbyterian Church in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania in 1933. The Rev. Hugh Thompson Kerr and his congregation sought to demonstrate the interconnectedness of Christian churches, regardless of denomination. Rev. Kerr appropriately chose the sacrament of Holy Communion to symbolize this unity. In 1940, the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America, which included all of the predecessor denominations of The United Methodist Church, adopted World-Wide Communion Sunday. United Methodists believe in an open table, anyone may receive communion. Our Book of Worships says, "All who intend to lead a Christian life, together with their children, are invited to receive the bread and cup." In United Methodist Churches around the world, a special offering is collected on World Communion Sunday to fund scholarships for seminarians. One half of the proceeds is for World Communion Sunday Scholars administered by the General Board of Global Ministries. The remaining one half is for the Ethnic Scholarship Program and the Ethnic In-Service Training Program, which are administered by the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry. Special Offering Envelopes will be provided for this offering.

# A cheerful heart is a good medicine, but a downcast spirit dries up the bones.... the discerning person looks to wisdom. (Proverbs 17:22, 24)

During my episcopacy, I have taught at a seminary, churches, and various organizations. While I have been the teacher, I have found that it is through the act of sharing and participation that true learning happens. It is my belief that learning and teaching are simultaneous acts that continue throughout one's life.

It was my joy for two weeks in August, to offer an intensive lecture at Emory University's Candler School of Theology. It is an honor to be named as McDonald Chair from the Candler community. The seminary course was "Christian Spirituality in the Global Context."

My interest is in exploring the newest movements of Christianity in the Global South and to ask the question, "How do we identify and join this exciting flow of spirituality?" I carefully studied the spirituality changes in the world so that in teaching and learning, we might grasp the mighty Holy Spirit's direction for a more intentional missional focus.

For instance, I like reading about the symbiotic power of teaching and learning as lived out in the faith development in China, where the socio-political context inhibits religion and yet Christianity continues to expand. I furthered my studies by paying attention to the coexistence of various religions and faith expressions in the multi-religious, multi-cultural, multi-racial world. This, then, impacted how I led and participated in inter-religious dialogue and encounters in the classroom. It has been through these educational experiences that I gained a broader sense of human rights issues and the beauty of human complexity. Indeed, interreligious dialogue and encounters have taught me true listening, serious questioning, and effective ways to stand on different sides of an issue and yet develop a relationship respect, care, and growth.

It is by critical listening, learning, and loving that we might have our eyes more open, our ears set for deeper listening, and our hearts more receptive to truly care for each other. This all begins by grounding ourselves in the tasks of conversation that include respectful dialogue that allows for the Creative Holy Spirit to work. All this I experienced when I encountered the young theologians and seminary professors this summer. With them I was challenged with new questions to ask and diverging conversations. It was in the enthusiasm and joy of our discourse, that drove me to pursue a different level of God, humanity, and creation.

The Scripture text from Proverbs invites us to live with a cheerful heart as we live our lives. I see this as an invitation to be cheerful when we enter tough conversations; to purposefully invite the Holy Spirit to join in the conversation and to seek wisdom – not necessarily being right. Imagine what a change this would be in our world today!

My hope is that this fall will bring a fresh wind of cheerful hearts and blessings to everyone. May we encourage one other in our church families, to learn courageously, practice love, dream anew, and seek wisdom.

May the Lord bless you.


